


154th FIGHTER INTERCEPTOR GROUP

NEW BENEFIT EFFECTIVE MAY 24 \$20,000, 24-HOUR INSURANCE COVERAGE OFFERED AIR GUARDSMEN

All National Guardsmen and Reservists under age 61 are eligible for up to \$20,000 of full time, lowcost group life insurance.

Effective May 24, President Nixon signed Public Law 93-289 which extended Servicemen's Group Life Insurance (SGLI) to Guardsmen on a year-round basis. Those still participating in training assemblies must attend at least 12 a year to qualify and those who have left the Guard with more than 20 years of service may be covered by SGLI until they begin to receive retirement annuities at age 60.

Participants may opt for less than \$20,000 coverage, or decline the insurance altogether. The premium is

85 cents a month for each \$5,000 coverage, or \$3.40 a month for \$20,000.

Payroll deductions for costs are automatic unless you decline participation or elect a reduced amount in writing. No monies have been deducted as to date, but each guardsman could be minus \$10.20 for the August, 1974 paycheck automatically deducted.

If you do not want the increased

benefits of SGLI, you must complete a declination form.

Information on this is available at the CBPO from TSgt John Davis. Any previous declinations are no longer in effect because of the new public law.

CONTANDER'S COMMENTS

To bring everyone up to date on the conversion of our aircraft to F-4Cs to

arrive in spring, 1976:
There has been considerable planning and work on facilities by the Civil Engineers, aiming toward a date one year and nine months away. There have been National Guard Bureau people to help plan for the coming of the F-4s, with augmentees and pilots to arrive before and

just following the delivery of the aircraft.
Our pilots will train on the Mainland,
and an F-4C will arrive sooner as a training aid for our maintenance people.

Our single biggest need right now is for the WSO-Weapons Systems Officer, to fly the back seat of the F-4C. There are a handful in Hawaii with experience, so the majority will have to be trained from scratch. Capt. Melvin Matsui, former POW, is a prospective member of the Air Guard, having flown as a WSO in Southeast Asia.

Again, we ask that every member report accidents as soon as they occur...there is apparently not enough importance connected with the timeliness of these reports to Safety.

154TW'S LOOKING FOR 1150s

HERE'S YOUR CHANCE TO FLY THE USAF'S HOTTEST JET FIGHTER

The 154th Fighter Interceptor Group NEEDS

If you want to fly the back seat of the hottest fighter jet--the Phantom F-4C-- and you are qualified, you can become a WSO, a Weapins Systems Officer when the jets are assigned in spring, 1976 to the 154th.

Candidates are actively being sought to enter flight training following officer commissioning and qualification.



BASIC REQUIREMENTS

Commissioned Officers must be entered into flight training before reaching 27 1/2 years. All others must be at least 20 1/2 and less than 26 1/2 years by commissioning, and entered into flying training before reaching

27 1/2 years.

Education requirements include at least 60 semester hours or 90 quarter hours of credits leading to a degree at an accredited university or college. College grads are given priority of selection for all initial appointments, and a thorough review of scholastic records will be made to insure a C average or above.

SAFETY TECHNICIAN SOUGHT

Just to be on the safe side, you may want to cross-train into the Group Safety Office as a Safety Technician. A vacancy is open to persons interested in inspecting, analyzing and reporting on all ground accidents and their causes.

Grade authorized for the slot is up to Technical Sergeant. Preferably, a background in electronics or related fields is helpful but not necessary, says Safety Officer Maj. George Joy, who can be reached at 449-2202. Applicants must qualify on the Air Force Officer Qualifying Test (AFOAT) and meet vision requirements.

Total training as a candidate for WSO

officers is about 18 months.

RECRUIT' VAN DEBUTS AT FAIR


The Hawaii Air National Guard Recruiting Ian made its first appearance at the State
