Finally, maintenance and repair of all personal equipment and drag chutes are carried out. Loo said that personal chutes are re-packed every 60 days, and a visible check is make every ten days. Chutes are also inspected prior to each in the Itakes about two hours to pack a chute Drag chutes require a half hour to pack

Good features of the new chutes are that they reduce the opening shock and are lighter in weight.

A testimonial to Loo's throughness in packing these chutes is the fact that he has seen only five bailouts in his 10 years with the Guard and all five plates are alive to prove it.
