

Last month, I wrote on characteristics that contributes to a healthy working environment. The three qualities I stressed were: (1) having a positive flow of constructive communication, (2) teamwork, and (3) giving active consideration for the people we work with. Well, there are obviously other characteristics that need to be addressed.

First, helping people move ahead to succeed. All of us are interested in making progress in our careers. Not too many people want to end up in a "dead end street" career. Thus, you must help people move ahead so as to boost their morale.

Secondly, sections that affirm people's strength and help people's weaknesses excel. Let's always try to applaud and praise our people for their strengths, and at the same time help them in their areas of weaknesses and difficulties. Let's avoid concentrating and dwelling only on the bad and weaknesses in people. Through a positive approach, let's constructively help to improve their quality of work. Everyone has something good to contribute which must be highly valued.

Thirdly, clear expectations. When people know exactly what is expected of them, they know exactly what to concentrate their efforts on. They are more likely to succeed. If they are unclear in what is expected of them,

they tend to be misdirected and frustrated. Also, expectations should and must be realistic and reasonable. If so, it will be a win, win situation.

And fourthly, positive attitude is the song of the day. When people are appreciated, encouraged, show trust and confidence, they become more motivated to put more effort into their work. Harsh words or attitude makes people withdraw and make them unproductive. A word of advice that I will always remember from a wise man is: "Always praise people in public and criticize them in private." I hope you will consider the above because even though we are good, we want to be better. May God help us to be all that He has created us to be.

### For the Family

When planning a trip to the Mainland, have you ever considered flying Space-A (space available) from Hickam's MAC Terminal? Most of us probably gave it some thought, but then chose the commercial route instead. The commercial way is expensive, but usually a lot more convenient. And yet, sometimes by flying Space-A with a little more effort, you will save a lot of money. Let me explain. Last week, I met with a representative from Hickam's MAC Terminal and he gave me some valuable information. This information may help you save some money.

If you want to go to San Francisco round trip from here, it may be quite possible. Currently there are about two flights (C-5 or C-141) leaving for Travis everyday. And currently, there are more than enough seats available. Once you get to Travis, there is a 2 hour bus drive to San Francisco and will cost you about \$20. (By the way, your flight to Travis will cost you \$10).

Now on your return trip to Hawaii, there's at least one flight coming to Hawaii everyday. If you are running a tight schedule and have to be back home in Hawaii by a certain date, then you may not want to plan a trip like this. Many times a one way flight is

more expensive than a round trip flight. However, if you have the time to spare, then flying back Space-A from Travis to Hawaii looks like a workable plan.

Second, there is a contract commercial (DC-8) flight with Hawaiian Airlines. The flight operates through Hickam's MAC terminal but flies out of the airport. This flight goes directly to LAX (Los Angeles Airport). Currently, there are more than enough seats available. It leaves once a week and right now on a Sunday. The return flight comes back on a Friday, but it's uncertain how many seats are usually available.

Space-A travel is a benefit available to you as a National Guard member. All you need to do is bring your military ID and DD Form 1853 to the Hickam MAC Terminal and sign your name on the waiting list. DD Form 1853 is a simple form that can be acquired from your unit, and it must be signed by your commander. Also, when you catch a flight out you must be in uniform (but not BDUs).

A Guard member doesn't need to be on active duty to take advantage of this benefit. The recommended time to get on the waiting list is at least two or three days prior. It's not necessary to wait physically at the terminal before the roll call time. At the roll call time, your name could be selected. By the way, rank doesn't get priority in determining who gets to fly out first.

For the traditional Guard member, dependents don't qualify to travel with you. If you have any questions, contact the Hickam MAC Terminal at telephone 449-6833, 449-2807 or 449-1270.

I hope the information is helpful. If you want more information that will help your family and other families, have your spouse or family member consider joining a family support group. To do this, contact your unit.

Haager NCOIC of Immunizations unless they have a Form 422 on file or in their shot record. No other immunizations will be given to an individual until they have received the 1991-1992 flu shot. Many garages will ask that you keep your containers.

Don't change oil too often. Read your manual. Many autos can go up to 7,500 miles before an oil change.

#### DRUGS AND DRINKING IN HAWAII

A nationwide high school survey has found one student in three has gone on a drinking spree, but fewer are smoking marijuana and only one in 50 is using cocaine.

In Hawaii, 7 percent of the public school students grades six through 12 were found to be heavy drinkers and 5 percent heavy drug users, according to a 1989 state Department of Education survey. Heavy drinking was defined as daily drinking or regular "binge drinking" of five or more drinks at one time; heavy drug use was defined by frequency, type and number of drugs consumed and includes daily use of marijuana or weekly cocaine use.

This national survey asked students about their behavior in the preceding 30 days to better gauge their actual habits, not just whether they'd ever experimented with booze or drugs.

These figures are sobering. It confirms that there is room for improvement in our fight against drug use

and alcohol abuse in our schools.

Your Social Actions office has information and handout materials that can be used to discuss drug and alcohol use and abuse with individuals of all ages. Now that we know that this problem exists, act now, talk about drug abuse and/or alcohol use with your family members now.

Recently, you met the people who work in Demand Processing. Over the next few months we'll introduce the Warehouse, WRSK, and MICAP, and Individual Equipment (IEU) sections. Though these sections are located adjacent to each other, their missions differ.

Although various organizations are classified as support units, the warehouse section of supply truly fits the description. This section exists primarily to provide storage and issue of the seemingly infinite items in cessary to perform our everyday duties, as well as our wartime mission. Normally a person from another organization would visit the warehouse to turn in an item. Otherwise, the warehouse personnel remain quietly in the background, constantly receiving and issuing items in support of the numerous missions the guard performs, not only on Oahu, but he neighbor islands as well.

SMSgt. Ray Takahashi is the NCOIC of the warehouse. His personnel maintain an inventory of over 12,500 line items, totaling more than \$54,460,000. It is a demanding, endless job requiring meticulous attention to detail, dedication and organizational abilities to place, identify and log the ever-increasing

inventory for future retrieval.

Numerous sections make up the warehouse staff, beginning with Warehouse Operations. This section, headed by MSgt. Frank Namamoto, is divided into Receiving, and Storage and Issue. Receiving processes all incoming property. TSgt. Edwin Hee, and SSgt. Dennis Hiu and Oscar Peltier ensure all items are properly signed for and match up with what was requested. Then, TSgt. Alvin Naumu and SSgt. Karen Cary, of Storage and Issue, provide for placement of all items as well as preparation of items for issue and shipment.

The Inspection section makes sure that all items presently in storage, and those to be issued or shipped, are in the condition stated for the action taken. In other words, if an item is to be shipped out for use, it should be in usable condition, where as an item slated for turn-in would not be repairable. MSgt. Pennis Fukumoto and TSgt. Sherman Dang work in

the Inspection section.

If an item needs to be picked up or delivered anywhere on Hickam, Pick-up and Delivery provides this service. TSgt. Ivan Mineshima handles these requests. The last section, Bench Stock Support, is run by MSgt. Jason Chun, with Sgt. Thomas Soriano assisting. MSgt. Chun's section is responsible for maintaining, reviewing, replenishing, and properly placing bench stock details in the correct bins.

### 154 Composite Group Goals for FY 92

- I. MAINTAIN AND IMPROVE MISSION CABABILITY: The primary goal for all units is to maintain and improve combat capabilities to ensure the highest levels of combat readiness. In support of attaining the highest levels of combat readiness, each unit must achieve an overall "C" rating of at least C-2 covering the areas of personnel, equipment and supplies on hand, equipment condition, and training. \*Attain a rating of excellent or better on all higher HQ inspections, i.e. Health Services Readiness Inspection, Unit Effectiveness Inspection, Operational Readiness Inspection. \*Achieve all identified milestones for unit activations/equipment conversions to facilitate an orderly and timely completion.
- II. EMPHASIS ON RECRUITING AND RETENTION: In view of the importance that unit strength plays in meeting mission capability goals, each unit will contribute towards achievement of overall 2% strength growth by year end FY92 with an overall increase in female members from 10.4% to 12% of total strength. Additionally, a retention cap of 9.5% or less will be achieved to complement recruiting efforts. \*Provide one out-of-state cross training trip each six months using the C-130. \*Accomplish one Employer Support of the Guard/Reserve (retention) or Center of Influence (recruiting) event during a semiannual period. \*Implement one first line military supervisor retention training workshop each semiannual period.
- III. IMPROVE QUALITY OF LIFE: Quality of life enhancements to the everyday work environment are essential to provide a climate which fosters productivity improvements by HIANG members. These enhancements can be tangible or intangible. Tangible environmental improvements include the provision for safer and more work conducive surroundings to include installation of planned aesthetically pleasing work station arrangements. Intangible improvements include managerial changes to implement programs to recognize deserving personnel and establishment of family support organizations in all HIANG units, "Support the "Healthy Warrior" program to enhance the wellness of COMPG members. "Install state-of-the-art storage systems in the base supply facility, better utilizing space and improving efficiency.
- IV. IMPROVE MANAGERIAL EFFICIENCY AND EFFECTIVENESS: Since the attainment of combat capability goals can only be accomplished through our human resources, it is essential that efficient and effective managerial skills are acquired. Each manager and supervisor must be scheduled to attend management related training by year end FY92. \*Identify minimum regulatory training requirements for new supervisors and ensure the training is scheduled within 30 work days after assignment. \*Minimize tasks that draw resources away from the primary mission. \*For those units whose supply fund allocation is less than the NGB cost model, reduce the dollar difference between unit supply fund allocations and NGB cost model to less than 10 percent.
