Commanders Corner

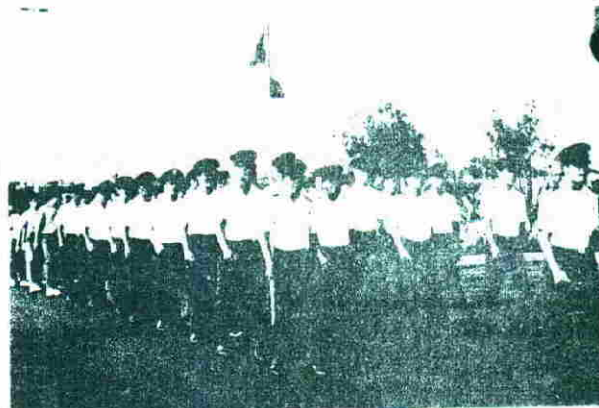

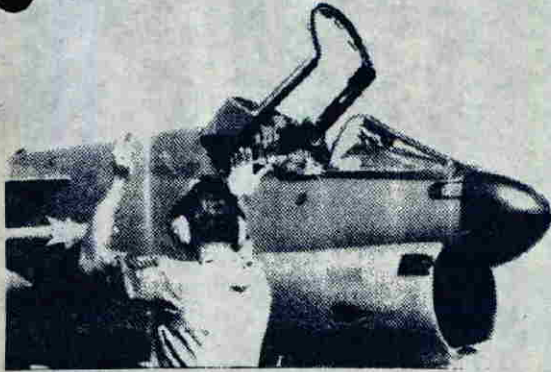

SENTRY TIGRE BARES ITS CLAWS



Sentry Tigre '86 is right around the corner. This year's exercise will be only one week, 13 - 17 January, but will include virtually every aircraft type stationed on Oahu.

The HANG F-4Cs will have T-33s and at times Arizona Guard A-7s joining them on the Blue Force team. Red forces will include both Marine F-4s squadrons stationed on Oahu as well as Marine and Navy A-4s and at time the A-7s from Arizona.

Unlike past years, this year's Sentry Tigre will not include any F-15s. Still, the exercise should provide some realistic multi-ogey training for HANG aircrews. Some flying periods will see as many as 24 aircraft involved in the air battle. The scenarios will range from the defense of the Islands to attacks on Red Force positions.

With the Arizona and T-33 pilots joining the HANG aircrews for mission briefings and debriefings, it will be a busy time around the hangar that week. The 199th TFS project officers are Maj. Mick Melich and Capt. Phil Skains. So, get ready, and let's make it the best Tigre yet!

New Pay Checks Effective with the first paychecks issued in December, all ARPAS checks will be printed on the new paper checks. The checks are a rainbow of pastels, from light blue to pale peach. They feature a full-length view of the Statue of Liberty, with a faint close-up of her face and torch on the right. "USA" is painted on the back in a pale blue which does not reproduce on copying machines. When the check is photo copied, the word "void" appears. Stains appear in the name of the payee and the amount if any attempts are made to alter them.

December Drill Checks We are requesting all units to expedite their rosters to meet the Dec 11 pay run. If this deadlining is met you can expect your paychecks on Dec 20, 1985.

Retroactive FY 86 Pay Increase You should have just received a check with the statement "Includes Pay Increase." This was for any duties you had performed after Oct. 1, 1985 and was paid the old rates (for most of you it was for the Oct. UTA). The retroactive pay was included under "other entitlement" on your statement.

Four hundred seventy five (475) Hawaii National Guard members participated in the Tuition Waiver Program for the Fall 1985 Semester. This total is the highest number of Guardspersons to participate in any given semester since the inception of the program in Fall of 1980.

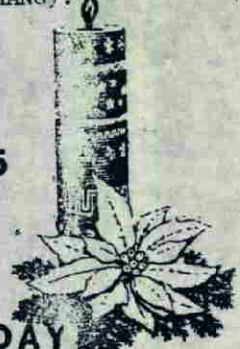
This semester's 475 total participants represents 257 Army National Guard and 218 Air National Guard personnel.

ROURKE NOMINATED FOR SECRETARY'S POST

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - President Reagan has announced that he will nominate Russell A. Rourke to be Secretary of the Air Force. Mr. Rourke would succeed Verne Orr, who plans to retire November 30.

Mr. Rourke has been Assistant Secretary of Defense for Legislative Affairs since May 1981.

Born in New York City, the 53-year-old lawyer has held a range of administrative positions in Washington, D.C., since 1960. He has been administrative assistant to three congressmen, special assistant to President Ford and Deputy to then Presidential Counsel.

John O. Marsh, Jr., now Secretary of the Army, after graduating from the University of Maryland in 1953, Mr. Rourke served for three years in the U.S. Marine Corps, including a tour in Korea. He retired from the Marine Corps Reserve as a Colonel.

Mr. Rourke is a graduate of Georgetown University Law Center. He is Married to the former Judith Anne Muller. They have three children - Patricia, Elizabeth and Mary Frances and reside in Annapolis, MD.

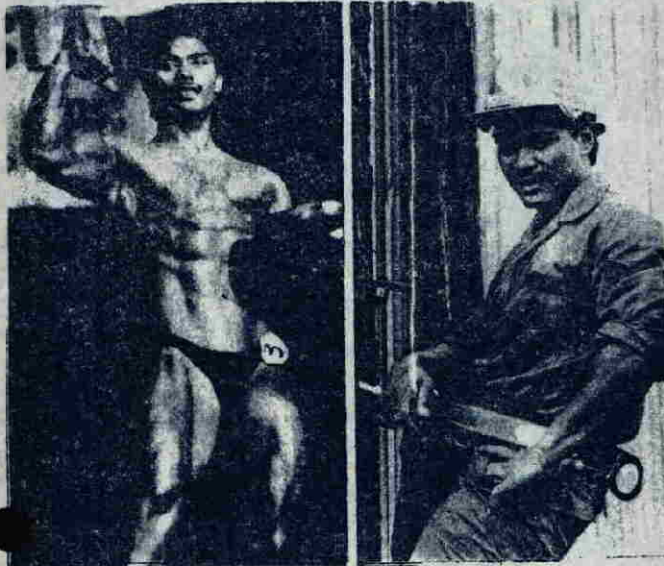

Supervisors should be aware of the recent changes.

SUMMARY OF CHANGES: Substitutes bimonthly checks for monthly weight checks; uses 6 pounds bimonthly as satisfactory weight loss for both men and women; adds hydrostatic weighing to establish a revised MAW to reflect BFM; permits flexibility in the use of locally developed products in lieu of AF Forms 379 and 393 under certain condition; places responsibility for monitoring the weight and fitness programs on the Chief, CBPO, or another officer appointed by the base commander; requires unannounced and unscheduled weight check once each quarter for members in the Probation Period; and modifies administrative actions for unsatisfactory progress for officer and enlisted in AGR and drill status to be taken by unit commanders for each period of unsatisfactory progress in weight and fitness programs; adds physical fitness questionnaire to be completed by all members prior to physical fitness testing.
