Couple these activities with

our "normal" list of exercises, deployments, and visitors and its evident we have another full plate. Inspections, our chance to show PACAF what we can do, will be high on the list next year. The 154th Tactical Hospital is expecting a Health Services Readiness Inspection (HSRI) in March; and the balance of the COMPAG is liable for an Operational Readiness Inspection (ORI) in the first or second quarter of FY93.

With these thoughts of things to come in mind, I thank you all for your hard work and efforts during the past year, and look forward to more of the same in 1992. I ask that you extend that thanks to your families and loved ones as well, for without their support we couldn't have made it all happen. Share a safe, happy

(The following are excerpts from an Air Force Times article written by Steven F. Kime, Director, Servicemembers Opportunities Colleges)

"...both the service and the individual need the wider horizons, critical thinking and analytical skills provided by coherent education programs. Neither the service nor the service member will reap these benefits of education from training sessions or even from a selection of career-oriented college courses. There are important points to ponder here. We cannot expect the service member to get very far with personal development if it is impossible to get beyond training, with its focus on specific facts and actions, to education, with its development of capacities for critical analysis and generalization.

Furthermore, we should not expect more than technical proficiency from our senior NCOs and petty officers who are trained but not educated. In other words, we may reach the limits of the individual's professional development if we stifle the education that must go hand in glove with training and professional growth..."

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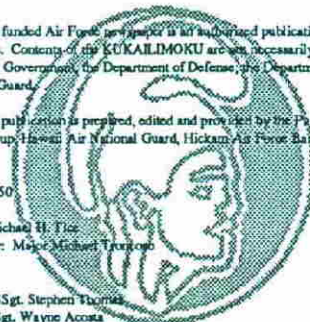

Just recently I read a classic short story called, "The Gift of the Magi", by O Henry. The story came highly recommended by a friend of mine. Della decides that \$1.87 isn't enough to do the job right so she sells her long beautiful hair for \$20. With the money she goes through several stores looking for a gift for Jim. Finally, she sees the perfect gift for him. It's a chain just right for Jim's gold watch. And to top it off, Della has enough money to buy it because it's \$21. Della buys the chain and comes home with a little left over, the remaining 87 cents.

Finally Jim comes home. Upon seeing Della with her long hair missing, Jim gives Della a strange look. It's not a strange look of disapproval or anything of that nature. The reason for the strange look is that his present to Della is something Della could use for her long and beautiful hair! While window shopping, Jim had many times noticed the longing Della had for the attractive and expensive set of combs that would suit her hair so well.

As it turns out, Jim sold his watch to buy a set of combs for Della's long hair, the long hair she doesn't have any more; and Della sold her hair to buy a chain for the watch that Jim had sold. But in spite of the seemingly unsuccessful attempts of both Della and Jim, Della and Jim remain upbeat and positive about the whole situation. End of story.

Following the story, the author of the story gives us insight into the story by saying that Della and

Travis. The next flight was scheduled for the next day. On the day I left for Travis, I felt very strange. Prior to the roll call time, I felt so awkward not knowing whether I would be in California or Hawaii at the end of the day.

For \$12.50 I was able to fly to Travis and this even included a meal. You can't beat that price! On the C-141 flight I felt slightly cool (temperature wise) at first, but as the hours clicked away I started to feel a bit too cool for comfort (notice I said cool, not cold). It was a good thing that I had a jacket on during the flight because me it kept going. After about 5.5 hours we arrived in Travis and it was great to be there. The personnel there were professional and helpful in getting all of the passengers situated. It was important for all of us who needed to catch another flight to get our names on the waiting list. This of course would be important for me because I would be heading back to Hickam after 6 days. After about an hour's wait, my friend picked me up at Travis and I would spend the next several days with him and his family. It was an enjoyable time in California.

On the first day that I was ready to return home, I was able to get the exact flight I wanted. There were 73 seats available on the C-5 flight to Hickam. I was the 53rd person on the roll call. When my name was called I was happy because I really didn't care to wait around for the next day for the next flight. My guess is that about 83 people wanted to get on the flight, which means about 10 people were left behind. Let me note here that many of the people trying to fly Space-A were retired personnel and thus in the same category as you and I, National Guard status.

The seats on the C-5 flight were more comfortable than the ones on the C-141. But to my surprise the flight was a lot longer. It took almost 7 hours to get to Hickam, but for about \$12.50 you can't beat the price. Someone said that perhaps it took longer because we were involved in a refueling mission. After we finally arrived at Hickam, I felt really good because my experiment worked and my mission was accomplished.

RECORD OF EMERGENCY DATA (DD Form 93):

Does the Air Force know who you want notified if you become a casualty? Only you can provide current data. Noncurrent data could delay notifications and payment of survivor benefits. Outdated beneficiary information could cause hardships for your survivors. When was the last time you reviewed and updated your DD Form 93? You, and you alone are responsible. (DPMA/449-5669)

NATIONAL DEFENSE SERVICE MEDAL (NDSM):

Reference ANGR/DP 141630Z NOV 91 message, the president has authorized award of the NDSM for all, repeat, all members of the National Guard and Reserve who were part of the selected reserve in good standing during the period August 2, 1990 to a date to be determined. This includes members on initial active duty for training or those awaiting initial active duty for training. Unfortunately the medals/devices are on order but as soon as they arrive, Personal Affairs section will be distributing appropriate awards/devices to the unit for presentation.

Hence, you may purchase the ribbon yourself but you won't be reimbursed. (DPMA/449-5669)

AFR 35-10 TIP OF THE MONTH:

Attache cases and gym bags. These items are to be carried in the left hand to allow members to render the proper military honors. Gym bags will be carried by hand—not over the shoulder by a strap. (154 MSS/DPMA/449-5669)

It isn't a fight against substance abuse alone, it's a fight against the sense of hopelessness that leads many a person to choose fantasy and not reality. In Honolulu police report that at least 19 of 33 murders that occurred were drug related. The surprising statistic is that the drug most often linked to these incidents was alcohol. Beer was almost always the beverage consumed by either the victim or the aggressor. Let's all be concerned about this problem and provide soft drinks at gatherings.

Safety is no accident

Holiday Safety

Each year thousands of families mark Christmas as a time of tragedy instead of joy due to deadly fires. The real tragedy is that most of these fires can be prevented. By following a few common sense tips, your family can enjoy a happy and safe holiday season.

Electrical fires occur throughout the year, but during the holidays they increase sharply. Be sure your outlets and circuits are not overloaded. Decorative lights are often used year after year; check carefully for frayed and worn cords and replace or discard them. Also use care when placing decorations which use bulbs, especially in windows where curtains or drapes can ignite easily.

Candles are very popular during the holiday season. These should be carefully placed as well. Never leave burning candles unattended. While a charming tradition, burning candles on a Christmas tree is very dangerous, even if you stay in the room. Trees dry out quickly and can ignite before you are able to take action.

A live tree should be bought as fresh as possible. Hold the tree upright and thump the base on the ground a few times; if the needles fall off, the tree has begun to dry. Before you mount your tree in a stand, cut an inch or two off the bottom of the trunk so it will absorb water more easily. Always keep the base of the tree in water and check it daily. (Evaporation can be slowed by adding beer to the water.) Dispose of your tree soon after the holidays, before it dries out. But never dispose of your tree by burning it indoors in a fireplace or furnace.

If you buy an artificial tree, be sure it is flame-resistant. And remember, these materials only retard fire; ultimately they will burn. In addition, the fumes generated by a smoldering artificial tree can be just as deadly as an actual fire. It is best to use the same care with an artificial tree as with a live tree. Place your tree away from fireplaces, radiators, and other sources of heat.

When making out your Christmas shopping list, consider a gift of life—give a smoke detector.

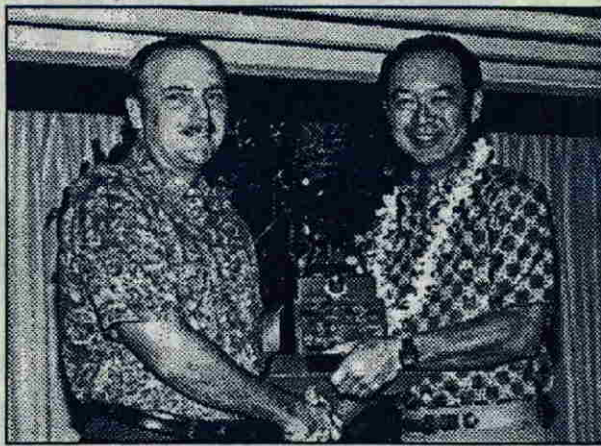
