COMMANDER'S CORNER

Thanks for a tremendous year! Twelve months ago, the 154th Group was undergoing Phase I of our HQ PACAF Operational Readiness Inspection (ORI) and preparing for Phase II. It was an outstanding effort, and though we failed to achieve an overall EXCELLENT score for the Group, the number of individual excellent and outstanding ratings was indicative of our professionalism and readiness.

Reflecting back on events since then, it seems the energy generated during the inspection hasn't diminished, but expanded as we progressed through the year. The formal activation of the 203rd Air Refueling Squadron in February and the potential it brings to the HIANG for the future definitely ranks as one of the year's highlights. Major training deployments by the Civil Engineers/Services Flight to Japan, and the Tac Hospital to Korea. The F-15 operations/maintenance community achieved a couple of "firsts" on a deployment to Singapore; the first ANG unit to participate in the "Commando Sling" exercise and our first training deployment for 30 days. Activation of the 154th Air Control Squadron on Kauai continued on schedule as they achieved combat capability. These activities, coupled with our "normal" list of exercises, TDYs, visitors, conferences and so forth, are evidence that the 154th Group is truly a dynamic organization.

1994 is shaping up to be just as, or more challenging than '93. Heading the list of activities are implementation of the long-awaited and much talked about reorganization of the 154th to the "objective" structure. This remains my number one priority; for what we develop, and we have some latitude, will have long term

effects on the unit. We are awaiting the expected announcements from the NGB on rubusting the KC-135 unit and activation of a 4-PAA C-130H airlift squadron. On the downside, we'll probably see a reduction in the number of F-15s we possess as well as a change in air defense alert posture.

Last year, we saw an increase in the effort in the design of a composite support facility to house the dining hall, hospital, CBPO and finance. The money for construction should flow this year, along with money for a facility to house the 154th ACS on Kauai. Continued facility improvements are high on our "to do" list.

Implementation of the HIANG's "Quality Guard" journey was also one of '93's achievements. Efforts in this area will accelerate this year as we pursue a change to the quality culture and work to stay abreast of the rapidly changing Air Force. You'll hear much about this initiative during the year as we begin preparation for our first Quality Air Force Assessment (QAFA) scheduled for October 1994. The QAFA process is supportive of the quality movement. It will require a significant effort on our part by way of training, understanding, preparation and execution.

We had a full plate last year and this year appears fuller. My sincere thanks to each and every one for making 1993 as successful as it was; and more momentous.

For the Family

Last month, I wrote about DRMO, a place where we can get some good bargains. There's another place we might want to check out. It's the Thrift Shop on base.

Hickam's Thrift Shop is a good place to shop, if you're looking for bargains. As a thrift shop, it sells all kinds of items from A - Z, including household items, at low prices.

Here's some basic information about the thrift shop. It's Bldg. 1714 that is located on the diamond head side of Hickam's Furniture Store. The hours are 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and the second Saturday of every month. Their telephone number is 449-6603.

After talking with the manager, Linda Kalinoski, I found more information on the shop. Since the shop moved to its present location in January 1993, business has picked up quite a bit due to its improved visibility from its former location. Anyone who is able to get on base is allowed to buy items at the shop.

The items sold here come from basically two sources: (1) items on consignment, and (2) items donated. After operating expenses, the profits go to charitable causes. There are currently 29 volunteers and 3 full time workers that make it happen.

Besides purchasing items at the shop, there are three opportunities that I can see here. One, we can donate items to help other people. There is a 24 hour donation container right outside the shop where we can leave our donated items. Two, we can offer ourselves as volunteers. Three, we can arrange for the shop to sell items for us on consignment. Just make sure the items are in good shape and you're asking for a reasonable price.

I hope that this information will be helpful to you and your family in saving money. If you want more help for your family, have your spouse or family members join a family support group. To do this, contact your unit.

HIANG Quality Improvement Board

After six weeks of intense activity, the HIANG's first Quality Improvement Board (QIB) is completing its work and preparing to brief the HIANG Commander and Adjutant General. Chartered under the recently implemented "Quality Guard" program for the HIANG, the QIB is using quality tools and processes to improve the work schedule in the 154th Group.

As a critical part of that process, the QIB identified external and internal customers for the 154th CAMS and associated support units. These customers' requirements are driving the improvement recommendation. The customer inputs gathered from the 850 respondents to the Group-wide survey administered at last month's UTA. The survey results formed the basis for the QIB's analysis and will be briefed to Brig. Gen. Rodrigues and Maj. Gen. Richardson.

The results indicate overwhelming support for a change in the workweek, but also indicate potential personal problems for a small number of respondents. Those problems are being considered by the QIB and will be addressed in the recommended improvement opportunity. The QIB conducted a follow-on telephone survey to confirm potential problems and ensure adequate consideration.

The Board includes members from across the Group and has been working for the past six weeks on a proposed workweek and schedule change. As indicated on the initial survey offered last month, the QIB welcomes the input of any traditional Guardsman. Reservist/Guard Commissary Privileges

Information from Air Force Reserve News Service

Congress has dropped expanded commissary privileges for members of the Guard and Reserve from the 1994 Defense Authorization Bill.

Acting on behalf of House and Senate conferees, members of the House and Senate Armed Services Committees agreed not to permit unlimited commissary privileges for Reservists and their family members. The House bill had recommended the expanded benefit.

Cigarette Sales Cut - Officials from the 15th Air Base Wing have cut cigarette sales at commissary outlets at Hickam from four cartons to one carton a day.

The cut in sales becomes effective Wednesday, December 1, 1993 and is due to help curtail abuse of outside sales, according to officials.

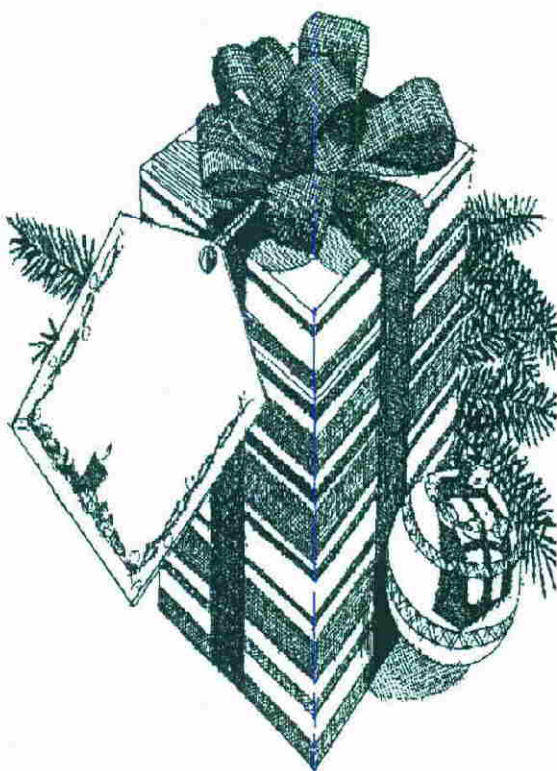
