ASHFORD TO RUGER APR. 1

LtCol James R. Ashford, 199th Fighter Squadron Commander, will relinquish command of the Fighter Squadron effective April 1, 1960. The colonel will be assigned to Headquarters, Hawaii Air National Guard, at Ft Ruger, as Director of Operations.

SIEFERMANN GETS STAR

Col Ashford has served as Commander since February, 1955.

Col Valentino A. Siefermann has been appointed a brigadier general in the Hawaii Air Guard.

The general, who is 40 years old, is Asst Adjutant General(Air)/C of S. His headquarters is at Ft Ruger. Under his command are the following units:

Maj Gen Fred W. McKinney, State Adjutant General, pinned general's stars on Siefermann in ceremonies Monday, March 14, at Ft Ruger.

The general joined the Air Guard in 1947 upon separation from active service.

Assuming command of the Fighter Squadron will be Major George R. Duncan, presently Operations Officer. Major Jarrott F. Carr, Red Flight Leader, will take over as Operations Officer.

Major Robert Hite, Air Operations Officer at Headquarters, HANG, will be on detached service to the Fighter Squadron as its Executive Officer.

Col Ashford began his military career as an Aviation Cadet at Luke Field, Arizona, in 1942, and was commissioned as a second lieutenant shortly thereafter. Upon separation from active duty in 1947, the colonel had seen service in England, France, Japan, and the United States.

Col Ashford joined the Air Guard in 1951.

His decorations include the European African Middle Eastern Campaign Medal, Air Medal with 13 Oak Leaf Clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

ANG AIDS CANCER SOC.

The Hawaii National Guard will participate in the American Cancer Society fund-raising campaign as a community service. the campaign, which has been under way since April 17th and will last through May 17th, has a goal of \$128,000.

The Guard's participation is limited to a house to house solicitation on Tuesday, May 3, 1830 to 2030 hours.

Oahu has been divided into six areas for this crusade, four of which are assigned to the Guard extending from Koko Head to Haleiwa and the Kaneohe - Heeia area. Each area is divided into approximately ten sections, and each section is assigned to a unit of the Guard.

The Fighter Squadron is assigned the Punahou-Manoa section. The Support Squadron is assigned the Moiliili-McCully section. Each squadron will provide about 11 volunteers, who will serve as crew leaders. Each leader will have approximately 20 workers under him. The Cancer Society will provide the workers.

HAWAII IN '60

To bring you up to date on the coming National Guard Convention, the following reflects information received from all sources, including travel agencies, airlines, etc.

With 29 States reporting confirmations, there are 2,043 confirmed attendants. The minimum estimated attendance is 3,240.

Of the hotels contacted, the Hawaiian Village seems most popular followed by the Reef, the Reef Tower, the Biltmore, the Waikikian, the Royal Hawaiian, and the Surfrider hotel.

United Air Lines and Pan American are the two main commercial carriers. Many delegates are chartering flights.
