ORI Results

The good news is THE ORI IS OVER! The overall rating for the 154th Group was a SATISFACTORY, and while that's not what we had hoped for, scores in most graded areas reflect a tremendous amount of hard work and dedication, and are ones we can be proud of. Understanding the total scoring system can be difficult because of its complex. The simple explanation is that in spite of the numerous EXCELLENTs and OUTSTANDINGs, we didn't have the right combination to score an overall EXCELLENT.

The bottom line, though, is that the ORI measured our ability to accomplish our wartime mission under realistic simulated contingency combat conditions and we validated, once again, our combat readiness.

Phase One, "Initial Response", which took place in December, was rated overall EXCELLENT. Major sub-areas were scored as follows:

- *Command and Control: SATISFACTORY.
- *Aircraft Generation: EXCELLENT.
- *Mobility/Unit Mobility Processing: EXCELLENT.
- *Aircraft Deployment: OUTSTANDING.
- *Aircraft Regeneration After Deployment: EXCELLENT.
- *Security: EXCELLENT.

Phase Two, "Combat Employment", which occurred in March, was rated overall SATISFACTORY. Major sub-areas were scored as follows:

- *Command and Control: SATISFACTORY.
- *Aircraft Maintenance: EXCELLENT.
- *Operations: SATISFACTORY.
- *Resources: SATISFACTORY.
- *Law of Armed Conflict: MARGINAL.

The "Ability to Survive and Operate" phase, also occurring in March, was rated overall SATISFACTORY with the following sub-area scores:

- *Command and Control: SATISFACTORY.
- *Active Defense Force: SATISFACTORY.
- *Passive Defense Facilities: SATISFACTORY.
- *Base Recovery After Attack (BRAAT): SATISFACTORY.
- *Sustainability: SATISFACTORY.

The 150th and 169th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadrons, rated separately under ORI criteria, both received overall EXCELLENT ratings. Sub-areas at those

units were all scored EXCELLENT or OUTSTANDING, a fantastic showing.

This afternoon at 1:00 pm, the 154th Group will celebrate not only the successful completion of the ORI, but all the other victories we scored in 1992 (something we overlooked at the end of the year due to "busyness"). Additionally, we'll be celebrating the promotions of many within our ranks, particularly within the CAMS who has taken on the responsibility for hosting the extravaganza. Good food, good people and good fun! See you there, and again, thanks for the tremendous ORI effort!

203rd Performs Inaugural Flight

A piece of Group history was made the morning of Wednesday, March 17th, 1993, when the KC-135R Stratotanker, "Hokupa'a", made the first operational flight for the 203 Air Refueling Squadron.

Aside from being the first operational flight for a HIANG Stratotanker, the flight was significant because it was the first time in 102 days that the aircraft had flown, and it was the first time the newly installed boom had been used. The aircraft was last flown when it was ferried from Tinker AFB in December.

Major Edwin Vincent, Chief of Operations and Plans for the squadron, said the maintenance shop had done a "great job" getting the aircraft ready for its inaugural flight. It went off without a hitch, with only a few minor discrepancies upon landing.

The aircraft commander was Lt. Col. Walter Kaneakua, Maj. Vincent was the Navigator, Capt. Stephen Su'a-Filo was the pilot, Capt. Elizabeth Malarkey served as flight evaluator and Sgt. Greg Genenbacher was the boom operator.

The flight lasted three hours and 44 minutes and encompassed a celestial navigation leg, meaning navigation by sextant, a refueling rendezvous with a C-5 Galaxy from Travis AFB, and a series of "touch and goes" at Barbers Point.

Maj. Vincent said by April 8th, there should be four KC-135Rs on the ramp. For the time being, three will be used for maintenance training.

SEXISM:

There are Traditional Male Roles, Too!

In the fall 1992 issue of the American Counselor, an article by John L. Swanson, entitled "Sexism Strikes Men" postulates that the 1990's may be for the men's movement what the 1970's were for the women's movement. He believes that the women's movement challenged many traditional roles of women and made each of us just a bit more sensitive to the problems and concerns of women. The 90's is the time period where the masculine mystique will engender a similar type of general understanding among us all.

The women's movement was mostly outward, women moving from home to the world of careers and politics. The men's movement is mostly inward with the focus of moving from careers and politics to self-awareness and discovery of interpersonal intimacy. Men and women are now poised on the threshold of a new way of understanding themselves and the world around them. Where territory that was, in the past, divided on sexual lines is now being redefined as individual lifestyle choices.

Warren Farrell, who has written extensively during the past twenty years about the men's movement, asserts that each sex has a unique socially conditioned experience of power and powerlessness. The women's liberation movement took a magnifying glass to women's powerlessness and men's power. Based upon their view, many have come to understand the female experience of powerlessness in a male-dominated society. Many people assume, falsely, that female powerlessness means male power! This bias is called the "new sexism" by Farrell. It can result in men feeling that they are responsible for keeping women in traditional female roles and cloud men from seeing that they too are equally trapped in traditional male roles. For example, women carry around a lot of bad feelings about being treated as sex objects. However, men suffer too from being treated as "success" objects. A male must not only be handsome to be considered a "good catch", but also have money and a good job that can provide the status symbol and wealth stuff - nice car, gold card, cellular phone, house, dog, etc... Women's romance novels and style magazines feed this fantasy just as men's playboy-type reading feed male fantasies.

The women's movement concentrates on the lack of women in certain high status jobs, while the men's

movement discusses how a man's role came to be "for" the family rather than "in" the family. In many instances the family can't benefit from what the father has to offer because he isn't around. They receive the fruits of male/father's labor, but not much of father.

There is much about parenting that is worth reclaiming by men. The traditional father role as coach, as an example. The quality of fathering affects a child's self-concept, achievement and social adjustment. The active presence of healthy fathers provides children with a confident, rich model of manhood.

A S T O R S'

This time of the year is a highly spiritual time for many people. Muslims take their journey to Mecca. Jews celebrate the Passover. Christians find great spiritual victory in Easter.

Spiritual renewal is what we need. We always need inspiration, direction, closeness to God and help to handle challenges. Life can really be stressful, competitive and complex. We can use all of the help we can get. I hope we'll seek opportunities to renew ourselves spiritually. With proper spiritual guidance, we will be able to make wise decisions that will have lasting and positive results.

But a word of caution is in order: not all spiritual guidance is beneficial. Spiritual influence that is cultist and/or extremist is strongly cautioned against. Recent actions by some "spiritual" people has reminded us to use good judgment in deciding what kind of spiritual teaching to follow.

The situation in Waco, Texas with David Koresh's cult is unfortunate. The word "cult" is used to describe this group because their teachings aren't commonly acceptable but bizarre and radical.

Uneasy reminders of Jim Jones and Guyana come to mind. Koresh apparently has the charisma to get his people to follow him at almost all cost and no matter what the

consequences are. Another unfortunate result of bizarre spiritual teaching is the practice of terrorism. The World Trade Center bombing comes to mind. Although still under investigation, the bombing apparently was carried out by religious extremists.

If it gives us any comfort, the type of behavior displayed in Waco, Texas and the World Trade Center isn't advocated by the vast majority of religious groups. But the message is clear: we need to use good judgment in deciding what kind of spiritual teaching to follow.

Spiritual teaching that promotes love, peace, patience, and self-control is beneficial and what we need. Spiritual teaching that promotes destruction, hate or violence must be avoided. The surrendering of all our resources to charismatic individuals is an effort to build man's kingdom instead of God's kingdom. Let's use our good judgment to follow what's truly right.

FOR THE FAMILY

In February's article, I highlighted some of Dr. Tannen's thoughts from her book, "You Just Don't Understand." If you remember, she wrote on how men and women have different expectations and needs. To finish what I started, let me add my comments.

Above all, it's important to point out that every person is unique. So we can't always stereotype people. We must strike some kind of a balance. On one hand, we must avoid generalizing the differences too much. But on the other hand, we can't avoid seeing the different trends and tendencies.

To know the differences between how men and women relate

is helpful, but not enough. It's only the first step. Respecting differences and then relating to differences are more important. This is where we can make improvements in our relationships. Thus, this is where we need to make adjustments.

Here are some ways to make adjustments. If women bond through conversation and men through activity, couples can plan activities that involve both talking and action. Walking, golfing and bowling are among some activities that could do the job. Men have a tendency to not want to ask for directions because of their desire for self sufficiency and the challenge of solving problems without help. (I heard a joke that went, "The the reason why the Israelites were lost in the wilderness for 40 years was that the men didn't want to ask for directions"). However, if men find themselves in a time-crunch situation, they must see that it's to their advantage to ask for directions. In parenting, some women find it harder than men to discipline their children. Perhaps it's because they feel that would cause a break in their relationship. Men, on the other hand, generally don't feel this because they feel comfortable in a hierarchal system where discipline is always there. But women could feel more comfortable if they see discipline as a way to show love. Finally, we must realize that there's a difference between discussing problems and solving problems. Even though women are interested in solving problems, at times they have an additional need to discuss problems to find understanding. Men don't always have to fix problems quickly, disregarding the emotional element of the problem. Sometimes women need comfort and a hug rather than a quick solution.

CBPO Connection

BDUs: We recently received an immediate message change to AFR 35-10 as well as guidance from NGB. Effective immediately, the BDU may be configured in the following three ways until October 1, 1995:

- A. The original style, i.e., tapes, rank, and patches.
- B. The Aircrew Style Name Patch alone.

C. The Aircrew Style Name Patch with subdued rank. For enlisted members subdued chevrons will be worn on the sleeves. Officers have an option of using subdued metal or cloth on the collar and hat depending on their working environment. There is no change to the Aircrew Style Name Patch configuration. The mandatory wear date still remains October 1, 1995.

AFSC CHANGES: The Air Force recently approved major changes in the Air Force classification system. The changes are the first major modernization of the more than 40-year-old system. The new system will have fewer Air Force Specialty Codes (AFSCs) and will be grouped with new alphanumeric designations to align with the new restructured Air Force. We will be less specialized. Seems like the old Army style MOS to me.

SGLI: Those of you requesting an increase in your SGLI coverage will now have to complete VA Form 29-8285, Request For Insurance, which is basically a medical certification. Member completes the form, has it certified by his unit commander and CBPO sends it to the Office of Servicemen's Group Life Insurance for approval.

FUN RUN: Congratulations to all the winners at the 2nd Annual HING Fun Run last Sunday. Special congratulations to one of our own - SSgt. Joanne Cooke who won in her age group. Legal Line



The President has directed the Secretary of Defense to conduct a review of the current DoD policy that excludes homosexuals from military service and to prepare a draft Executive Order by July 19, 1993.

In the meantime, where separation proceedings have been initiated for homosexual status or conduct and members contest the discharge action, or if the case involves an officer, the National Guard Bureau has directed that cases will be forwarded to the Secretary of the Air Force (SecAF).

If the SecAF determines that discharge is warranted, the case will be referred to the US Attorney General's office (AG). It is believed that the AG may then suspend the discharges until the President acts on the recommendations of the Secretary of Defense. Those members will be placed in the stand-by Reserve. Should current policy be changed, those members may be given the option to return to the Selective Reserve.

Also, commanders may, in the interest of the individual or unit concerned, make changes in the assignment of personnel while separation action is pending.



Self Aid and Buddy Care

Editor's Note: The KUKAILIMOKU will be running a series of articles on Self Aid and Buddy Care over the next several months. Study hard... there will be a quiz. (No kidding.)

During war, medical care will be based on the Air Force "Echelons of Care" system. It is critical for you and your fellow Guard personnel to know how this system works as well as what to do for some common injuries. This medical system is designed to be "the most effective and efficient means of providing for the professional medical care of casualties close to the combat area, rapid evacuation of those requiring definitive treatment, and early return to duty of combatants with a minor illness or injury."

The "Echelons of Care" are as follows:

1. First Echelon = SELF AID AND BUDDY CARE.

2. Second Echelon = This is where the casualty will first meet up with medical personnel. The 154 Tac Hosp trains for the type of mission. It is similar to the "MASH" program seen on TV, without the surgical capability.

3. Third Echelon = A medical treatment facility at the rear of the theater of combat with surgical capability.

4. Fourth Echelon = Medical facility for longer term care.

Without a doubt, you and your buddy's survival may depend on SABC. SABC is the first care an injured person will receive. It is imperative that ALL Guardsmen know the skills of SABC.

This is the first of monthly articles that will review and test your skills in care for bleeding, dressings, bandages, fractures, splints, shock and victim transportation.
