UNLIMITED EXCHANGE PRIVILEGES SOUGHT FOR GUARD AND RESERVE

WASHINGTON, D.C. (NGAUS) -- National Guardsmen and Ready Reservists soon may be authorized unlimited exchange privileges any day of the month, according to a defense department letter.

Because of "certain shortcomings" inherent in the current policy that permits unlimited exchange privileges on drill training days, the defense department has recommended that the day limitation be removed.

The problem with current policy is "the inability of many eligible Reservists to use these facilities". Remote training locations and scheduled training hours preclude use of the exchanges by many Reservists.

The proposal, which also will make exchanges available to non-paid Ready Reservists attending training, awaits concurrence from the House Armed Services Committee.

Once approval is obtained, it may mean the exchange service up to six weeks before the "machinery is well-oiled" to allow Guardsmen and Reservists unlimited privileges.

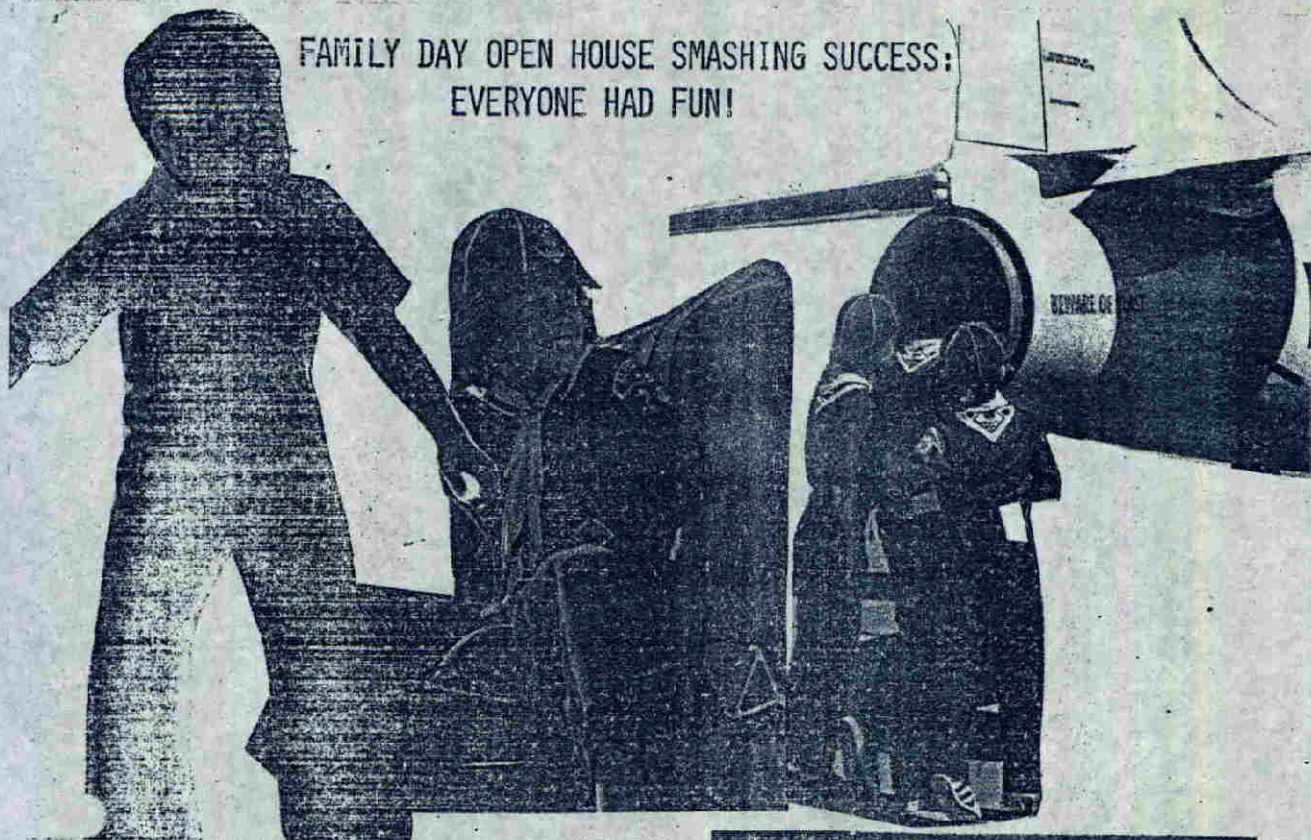

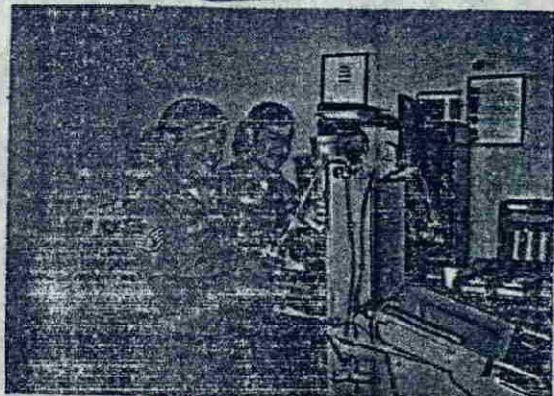
EGRESS SHOP MOVES TO NEW QUARTERS

TSgt. Ken Morimoto and SSgt. Mike Montero have moved their Egress Shop to the hangar from Battery Selfridge. Their specialty is the rocket ejection seat.

The rocket ejection seat has been used three times since it replaced the old catapult system on MIANG aircraft. It has functioned well each time and can be credited with saving the lives of two of our pilots.

The seat is powered by a rocket which burns about 3/4 of a second when activated. During ignition it speeds the pilot clear of the plane and then is separated from the pilot before his chute opens.

The rocket seat is a real safety break-through because it



can safely eject the pilot from zero altitude at zero speed, whereas the catapult required both altitude and speed in order for the pilot to clear the plane and have enough height for his chute to open and descend properly.

Ken and Mike have even installed air-conditioning in their new quarters. So, if your freinds are looking for a good place to work, recommed the Egress Shop, they need another man.
