COMMANDER'S CORNER

As you could have guessed when we had our practice mobilization recall yesterday, we will begin honing up for our anticipated major inspection (ORI/MEI) sometime during the October-November-December '82 timeframe. How can you as an individual contribute toward this preparation period?

First, dedicate yourself toward being an asset rather than a debit to your section's ledger. Take care of your personalities, help your team mates to succeed and maintain a positive attitude.

Each UTA we will concentrate on improving a selected number of performance factors. During the August annual training and UTA days we expect to "dry run" and assess all of our strengths and correct all of our identified weaknesses.

Each of us will need to study and review some basic things about our job so that we can provide proper guidance and/or accomplish tasks when given guidance. We are "shooting" for the "expert" performance standard.

For some of our new personnel who will be participating for the first time in an ORI/MEI, they should be aware that the 154th Composite Group is tested once every two years on how well we can do our mission. PACAF/IG utilizes the same report card standards that they apply to the regular Air Force units throughout the Pacific. It is the hardest and most rigorous test which is applied to the unit...to determine our probable combat performance capability. In 1980, the 154th Composite Group attained an overall rating of "excellent" for both

the ORI and the MEI phases of the PACAF inspection.

If we count our UTA training dates that we have left to be ready, we have eight days to make it. Your contribution toward this preparation period will establish the basic level for our performance when tested.

PAY INFORMATION

On April 17, 1982 the Hickam AFB Communication Center failed to transmit our pay card to the Accounting and Finance Center in Denver. This affected 726 pay transactions that were scheduled for the April 30, 1982 paycheck. These pay cards which includes all types of performance such as SUTAs, PTs, ATs, etc that were performed prior to April 13, 1982 were retransmitted to Denver on April 26, 1982 with an expected pay date of May 6, 1982.

Heatherly has been promoted to civilian pay technician leaving only two military pay clerks to process the voluminous number of pay transactions that occur on a daily basis.

"Frankly Speaking"

Henry David Thoreau, whose love simplicity often took him into solitude, often wrote of the sensitive side of man. "The finest qualities of our nature, like the bloom on fruits, can be preserved only by the most delicate handling."

How easy it is to destroy the only approach to man's true self. And how often communications are broken down by the brutal force of "getting to the point," and speaking "frankly."

The only time an agreement has been reached by the "frankly" route is when two people already believe the same thing. And it is a most infrequent occasion when two people can meet head-on and believe the other honest because he is direct and wordy.

More often, there must be some thought given to the sensitivity of the other person. First, he is a human being with human dignity. He has feelings and thoughts and he has strong likes and dislikes. And it is a considerate person who has the sensitive perception and insight into the heart of someone. And because of his thoughtfulness he can be more honest and direct and progress by it.

Nevertheless, if one has to be constantly on the outlook to keep from offending a friend, then he is not really a friend. It isn't difficult to be a friend to someone who endears himself to everyone. Indeed, it is a pleasure to be counted his friend. But it is another thing altogether to be a friend to someone who finds little friendship anywhere.

Other people seldom see us as we are. In fact, who we truly are is lost somewhere among our daily contacts. We react differently to nearly every person we meet. Their personality and ours may blend beautifully or it may clash horribly. And we can rather tell where the fault lies when we balance out the blends and the clashes. The test was sponsored by the U. S. Army Ballistic Missile Command and coordinated by the Defense Nuclear Agency.

Maj. Tice says preparation began six months prior to the mission which required the firing of a special test missile at an altitude above 50,000 feet, thus the need for the high-pressure suits.

Tice said, "We deployed to Kwajaleen on April 2nd and flew practice profiles on Saturday, the 3rd, and Monday, the 5th. On Tuesday, the 6th, we made a thirty-degree climb and released the missile at 55,000 feet and the plane then topped out at 72,000 feet." Maj. Tice was the back-up and Capts. Pickering and Melich flew the mission. Tice said, "The purpose of the flight was to gather radar data off the missile...and we got even more data than anticipated."

The 161st Arizona ANG Air Refueling Group and the California 146 TAW were also commended by Gen. Conaway for tanker support.

SAFETY NOTES - CAPTAIN JOHN C. RAMOS, 154 COMPG/SEG

Summer is just around the corner. Whether you will be doing some traveling, participating in sports and recreational activities or just doing things around the home, here are some safety tips that you should keep in mind and be familiar with in order to make the summer months more enjoyable to you and your loved ones:

1. Get your body in tune. Have a checkup if you're planning physical activity. Drink plenty of liquid (not alcohol) when working out in warm weather.
2. Use a buddy system when you go swimming in areas where no life guards are posted.
3. If you're camping, remember that tents can burn. Keep fires or stove a safe distance from the tent. Use battery lights inside tents.
