



The Hawaii Air National Guard welcomes their newest aircraft, the C-130H. This operational support aircraft arrived on June 18 from the 130 Tactical Airlift Group of Charleston, West Virginia.

The C-130H provides greater cargo carrying capabilities over a longer distance than its predecessor, the C-130A. Powered by T-56A-15 turbo propeller engines, it is able to land on short, unimproved air fields and has roll on/off capabilities. It also has the capacity to carry 74 litters, 92 ground troops, 64 paratroopers, or 80 passengers for overwater flights. The plane flies with a minimum crew of 4, consisting of a pilot, co-pilot, flight engineer and loadmaster. A navigator is used for overwater flights.

The addition of this aircraft will greatly enhance the ability to support the mission of the Hawaii Air National Guard units.

A dedication ceremony will be held today at 4:30 p.m. on the Mike taxiway, near the fuel shop.

SKY HIGH! With the Hawaiian Moving Company

If you turned on your television recently and saw Hawaiian Moving Company host Michael W. Perry sporting a Hawaii Air National Guard flight suit and climbing into an F-15 you were seeing correctly.

Following months of preparation, and special design work and engineering by the 154 CAM Squadron to accommodate the Hawaiian Moving Company broadcast camera, the flight was set for June 21, 1989.

Michael Perry arrived early in the morning, following his radio program on K-59, to accomplish his Egress training. "I got all the way through the training and didn't see a single bird," quipped Perry, who had established a running joke about the "egret training" he had to undergo prior to the flight.

Capt. "Lordy" Dowson met with Michael following egress training, along with Lt. Col. Mike Tice, Capt. Ro Johnson, and Lt. Brad Sakai, the other members of the flight team that would be participating in the mission that day. Capt. Dowson would be flying the "B model" two-seater as part of that day's training. Perry would be riding in the back seat.

While the flight briefing was in progress, the Moving Company's camera crew, which consisted of producer Randy Brandt, cameraman Don Kozono, and audio technician Bill Paris, attached a camera to a special mount inside the B-model's cockpit and set up a separate camera to shoot the sequences leading up to Michael getting into the aircraft.

Excitement mounted as a small audience gathered by the aircraft to watch the shooting sequence. The crew shot numerous segments that would be used to "bridge" between other segments of the Hawaiian Moving Company program. Thus, Michael W. Perry opened the program talking to Lordy Dowson then turned to the camera and welcomed the audience to this week's edition of the Moving Company. Subsequent segments showed Michael climbing into the aircraft and taking off. The camera mounted inside the aircraft gave a spectacular view of Perry in the back seat and all the scenery behind him. At one point, you could see the ships piloted by Tice, Johnson, and Sakai flying behind the B-model and then simulate a fan break in the background. It was spectacular stuff. The program aired July 2 at 6:30 p.m. on KGMB, channel 9.

NO FAULT INSURANCE PENALTIES INCREASED

It will cost you \$1000 if you are found to be operating a vehicle in Hawaii without a valid No Fault Insurance card. The fine is mandatory and automatic and stems from changes in the law signed into effect by Governor John Waihee June 16, according to Janelle Saneishi of the State Judiciary Public Information Office. But that isn't the only penalty of which you should be aware. If you drive on Hickam, for example, and are found to be without a valid No Fault card your on base driving privileges will be revoked for one year! That is the result of new changes in the regs that went into effect Mar. 15, 1989.

The bottom line here is that it will be infinitely cheaper in the long run to drive "legal". The new \$1000 fine replaces the old \$100 fine. Furthermore, subsequent violations will cost you \$3000 a pop and these fines can be imposed on the driver AND the registered owner of the vehicle. That amount is up from the old fine of \$400.

In addition to these stiffer penalties, insurance companies might now charge you a surcharge of as much as 100% if they determine that you have been driving a vehicle with no insurance or insurance that has lapsed.

The moral of this story is that if you have a car or drive a car that belongs to someone else or own a car that someone else drives, you'd better have valid No Fault insurance or be prepared to pay the piper and possibly lose your driving privileges for a long time.


A little ahead of them in the baby department, the



Several months ago, a good friend of mine died and left behind his wife and children. His death made me sad, because he was so relatively young. He was in his late 30s. I thought he had so many great years ahead of him. It still disturbs me to think about all of the positive things he could have done but now unable to because of his untimely death. It appears to me that death at an unexpected age is not uncommon these days.

Before we leave this world, one of our major concerns must be for those we leave behind. Sorrow for the loss of a loved one is usually guaranteed, but it would help if we could minimize their sorrow. Death shouldn't be approached with fear but with preparation. It would be an excellent idea to talk with your family about what you desire when your turn comes up. Consider if your will is up to date, or if you have adequate life insurance, or if your family knows what you want at your memorial service, or other important decisions.

Proper planning may help you in several ways. It will remind you not to take your family for granted. They might not be around as long as you expect. It will also give your family more security. It will also relieve confusion when you die because they will know your wishes. So, plan wisely and minimize the pain they will experience.

I hope that the above comments will help you to evaluate your plans, because I know that you care about your family. Dealing with Everyday Problems: Some Suggestions

Each day we all must deal with little things. Like the bus being late, someone opening their car door and tapping your car, the HIANG's way versus your way, the kids or your spouse. Oh, nothing really big just the little things that just get to you, but there's nothing you can do about them. We in Social Actions want to pass along advice provided by the Mental Health Association in Hawaii on how to deal with everyday problems. (1) Talk it out. When something worries you, talk it over with a close friend or with the people involved. It helps get rid of pentup feelings, define the problem and find the solution. (2) Escape for a while. A change of pace - a movie, book, game, brief trip or even a 20 minute nap- can give you a new outlook on old problems. (3) Work off your anger. Do something constructive with your anger. Pitch in to a physical activity like tennis, swimming, a long walk, or some do-it-yourself project. (4) Give in occasionally. Even if you're dead right, it's easier on your system to give in once in a while. If you yield, you'll often find others will, too. (5) Do something for others. This will take the steam out of your own worries and-even better-give you a nice feeling of having done well. (6) Taking one thing at a time. The worst part of tension is the trapped feeling. Taking one thing at a time breaks the vicious circle and proves it can be done. (7) Shun the "Superman" and "Wonder Woman" urge. No one can be perfect. Pick the things you do well, and do them. (8) Go easy with your criticism." Search for the good points of another person's behavior and help to develop them. (9) Give the other person a break. Competition is contagious, but so is cooperation. (10) Make yourself "available". If you're made to feel "left out," slighted, neglected or rejected, it's healthier and more practical to keep "making yourself available" instead of shrinking away and withdrawing. (11) Schedule your recreation. Recreation is essential for good physical and mental health. Get involved with a hobby that you enjoy and which lets you forget about your problems for a while.

Colonel Matsui says, "This will help expedite the transmission of important documents, letters, graphs, charts, etc. What that means is less chance for miscommunications and misunderstandings. We can now almost instantly transfer information more efficiently and more accurately and that will help our people be more productive."


CAM NEWS AND VIEWS

CBPO CONNECTION

The Department of Defense announced that due to the non-availability of the programmed Commissary Privilege Card (CPC), the interim commissary privileges which went into effect January 1, 1989 have now been extended until July 1, 1990.

The same rules will apply for establishing eligibility: A copy of any active duty orders for 1988 and a valid ID card for sponsors or proof of dependency of an eligible sponsor for dependents. However, new limitations have been imposed. Each eligible member is allowed 12 shopping days for the period of July 1, 1989 to June 30, 1990, as basic entitlement. In addition, members are entitled to shop when in an active duty status with orders effective for that day. When entering the commissary the qualifying order will be date stamped. Members are cautioned to use the same set of orders for each entry to avoid exceeding the prescribed number of days of entitlement (12).

UNIFORM TIPS (Ref. AFR 35-10)

Members may wear wristwatches and rings. No more than three rings at any one time is permitted. One bracelet is also permitted, if it is neat and conservative, does not detract from a proper military image, is not wider than 1 inch, and does not subject the individual to potential injury.

Attache cases and gym bags will be carried in the left hand to allow members to allow members to render the proper military honors. Gym bags will be carried in the hand and will not be carried over the shoulder by a strap.
