Harold Nagai was reassigned from the HIANG Headquarters operations staff to the 199th FIS where he succeeds Lt. Col. Hong as commander.

Lt. Col Hong is a U. of H. graduate. He joined the Hawaii Air National Guard in 1957 following active duty with the Air Force. He was named commander of the 199th in January, 1968. He also holds

In a recent message, the Air Force Chief of Staff outlined the change to AFM 35-10 which emphasizes the intent to maintain an appropriate military image.

"Each Air Force member must maintain a high standard of dress. Uniforms will be kept clean, neat, correct in design and specification, and in good condition. Uniforms will be kept buttoned, including pockets, and shoes will be shined and in good repair.

"Focusing on haircuts, the revised manual states hair must be clean, must present a tapered appearance on the sides and back both with or without headgear, must be well-groomed, i.e.,

nged in an orderly manner, a look natural if artificially colored."

And as if that wasn't already too good to believe, the controller has announced that effective July 1, 1973, that certain members of HIANG also qualify for additional pay as station allowances and cost of living allowances. Within certain limitations, airmen E-4 with four years service and those of higher grade will receive the al-

inces while on active duty.

This means that an E-4 with
four years service and dependents
will receive about \$3.85 additional
station allowance for each day of
active duty performed.

DO SOMETHING ABOUT IT!

You really can do something to improve the food service of the 154th FIG.

First, if you are a person with some managerial experience and capability, and a desire to improve things, then you might apply for the available position as mess hall supervisior. CWO Beman points out that you can cross train, no schooling is required (just OJT) and there are E-6 and E-7 slots open.

Second, remind your supervisor to help CWO Beman accurately project his food requirements by notifying him two weeks in advance of drill of the expected attendance of your

section.

Food must be ordered 10 days to two weeks in advance. It is ordered on the basis of a projection of the number of meals to be served liowever, the mess hall is only paid on the basis of meals actually served. Thus, if the projection is inaccurate, your meals cost mor and you get less.

This problem is especially acu on split drill week-ends. So pleas kokua...be accurate and timely wi your head count to CWO Beman.
