199TH SURVIVAL TRAINING

All of that training you see our pilots involved in today is part of their annual water survival training program. Some of the essentials include ground school as well: equipment preflight, personnel parachute and parachute landing falls. The training also includes training on the survival kit, signalling devices, Coast Guard Search and Rescue, water drag and dunking. This training can mean the difference in coming home or not if an aircraft goes down.

DRUG ABUSE POLICY

Drug Abuse is incompatible with ANG standards of conduct. The illegal or improper use of drugs by ANG members can seriously damage physical and mental health, jeopardize an individual's safety and the safety of others, be detrimental to the ANG mission and lead to criminal prosecution and/or discharge. The policy is intended to maintain standards of behavior, performance, and discipline for mission accomplishment.

Airmen may be discharged for misconduct under ANGR 39-10 based on drug abuse, which is introduction on a military installation of, the illegal, wrongful, or improper use of or the possession, sale or transfer of any narcotic substance, intoxicating inhaled substance, marijuana, or controlled substance.

The ANG has no rehabilitation program. And discharge for use of

drugs in most cases is under other than honorable circumstances.

Military members who fail to comply with an order to provide a urine sample for the drug testing program may be subject to punitive or administrative actions for failure to obey a lawful order.

LIKE A HURRICANE

Hurricane season is upon us. These violent storms pose a very real danger and everyone living in vulnerable areas should take them seriously, particularly those who live in coastal and island areas. By making a few advance preparations, you may save possessions--or even lives. Here is a partial checklist of things to do before, during and after a hurricane.

Familiarize yourself with safe routes inland and learn the location of official shelters. When a hurricane watch is issued for your area:

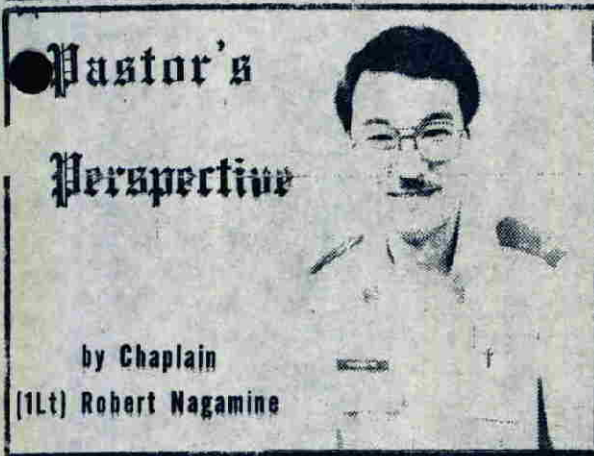
- Check often for official bulletins on radio and TV. It is essential that you have at least one portable radio with good batteries.
- Fill your car's gas tank.
- Stock up on canned goods.
- Check supplies of special medicines and drugs.
- Have flashlights and extra batteries on hand.
- Secure lawn furniture and other loose items outdoors.
- Tape, board and shutter windows to prevent shattering.

If a hurricane WARNING is issued for your area:

- Evacuate the area if you live in a mobile home or if authorities recommend it.
- If you stay home, secure the house and move valuables to upper floors.
- Bring in pets.
- Fill containers with several day's supply of drinking water.

This advice was issued by the National Weather Service. It is

useful, but if you are living in a hurricane area, you should check with local authorities for more detailed advice pertaining to your locality.

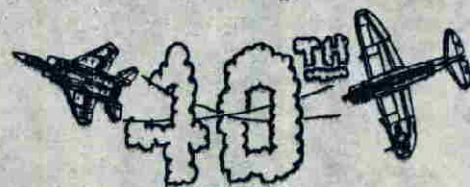

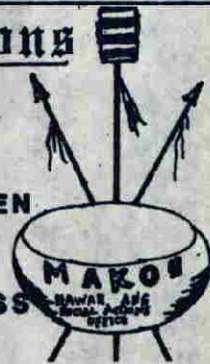

We all know that cocaine and marijuana are illegal drugs. If that's true, how come so many people are doing coke and smoking buds out in the open? The answer is that now everyone gets caught. In fact, most illicit drug users don't get caught, but for those who do the next question is "so what did you get?" The answer is you get plenty.

Marijuana is considered a detrimental drug. The possession of 2.2 lbs. or more, the sale of 2 oz. or more or the transfer of any amount to a minor is considered a class "C" felony. You could get up to 5 years. If you possess 1 oz. or more or sell any amount that's a max of 1 year.

Cocaine is considered a dangerous drug. Just for possession of any amount of cocaine you could get 5 years (class "C" felony). If you sell or distribute any amount or possess 1/8 oz. or more, that is considered a class "B" felony. You could get up to 10 years in OCCC. If you sell any amount to a minor (anyone under 18) or sell/distribute/transfer an amount of 1/8 oz. or more or possess more than 2 oz. that's 20 years mandatory sentencing.

As you can see, the question "what did you get?" is real important to those who get caught. Be smart, don't use or even experiment with illicit drugs. That way nobody will ever have to ask you the question "What did you get?"

SAFETY - SEATBELTS MAKES A DIFFERENCE

-from the Safety Office

Here are some statistics showing that seatbelts do make a difference in an auto accident:

-For every one percent increase in safety belt use, about 172 lives will be saved.

-About 50 percent, or 34,000 of all people who die in passenger cars, trucks or vans, could have been saved if they had been wearing their safety belts.

-Safety belts cut your chances of being killed or seriously maimed in a crash by more than 50 percent.

-On any single trip the chance of an accident is very low; but the possibility of a serious accident on one of the many trips in your lifetime is better than 50 percent.

What percentage of your friends have never been in an accident? Ask around...the percentage is low.

-Three out of four crashes happen within 25 miles miles! of home.

-A common cause of death or injury to children in automobiles is being crushed by adults who are not wearing seatbelts. In fact, one out of four serious injuries to passengers is caused by occupants being thrown into each other.

Drivers wearing safety belts have more control over their car in emergency situations and are therefore more likely to avoid an accident.

d. Course of fire:

- 1) Distance will be 10 meters (33 Feet)
- 2) 10 shots prone position
- 3) 10 shots sitting position
- 4) 10 shots kneeling position
- 5) 10 shots standing position
- 6) Time limit of 20 minutes
