PERSONNEL NOTES

Congress recently enacted legislation that would permit members of the selected reserve components, including the National Guard, to use military commissary stores up to 14 days per year at their discretion based on their performance of active duty for training. We are awaiting guidelines from the National Guard Bureau for implementation of this change in benefit. Until such time, the current procedures for use of the commissary stores while performing active duty for training will continue.

Other items of interest enacted

by the 99th Congress:

Military and civilian personnel receive a 3% pay raise effective

January 1, 1987.

The consent of a governor may not be withheld with regard to active duty outside the United States, its territories, and its possessions, because of any objection to the location, purpose, type, or schedule of such active duty. The governor will still have the authority to block the training if guardsmen are needed for state or local emergency, such as flood or other natural disaster.

The bill contains changes to treat single parents leaving active duty to join the National Guard and Reserves under reenlistee rules rather than under new enlistment rules.

Increases presidential call-up authority from 100,000 to 200,000 and extends 90 day limitation to 180 days.

Orders of reserve component members in a captive status can now be extended by the service secretary for the period of captivity plus 30 days without requiring member's consent.

Contains provisions that restructure compensation payable to members incapacitated in the line

of duty.

ANG FLU PROGRAM AND THE TAIWAN FLU

Hong Kong Plu, Taiwan Plu, Swine Plu, England Plu, I flew, he flew, we all flew...it sounds very confusing and very distressing. put it simply, the Air National Guard does have a Flu Vaccination Program which changes every year.

This year's program vaccinates HANG personnel against the flu strains which were identified in Chile, Mississippi, and Ann Arbor. These types of flu had been circulating this past year and are thought to be most likely to occur in the United States this winter.

However, another type of flu influenced the health of communities in the United States and is called the "Taiwan Plu". Vaccines for this flu is presently not available as a supplement to HANG's Flu Program. If anyone feels that they are at a high risk for a serious illness after getting flu, check with your own private physician for availability of the Taiwan Vaccine.

Throughout the past year the Social Actions office has informed it's readers about sexual harrassment, alcohol abuse, the effects of illicit drug use, mainly cocaine and marijuana, and the impact that drugs could have on a HANG career. We selected topics that would inform HANG members about issues they face in today's employment environment so that they can make informed choices about their future.

As the holiday season approaches we in Social Actions want to ask that you remember to make informed choices. FROM THE JAG

It is no secret that the legal use of drugs cannot be tolerated in the Air National Guard. Common sense, education programs, administrative regulations and penal laws leave no doubt that drug abuse is intolerable in Guardsmen. In spite of briefings, training and warnings about implementation of urinalysis inspections, several of our people that they continued to believe could avoid detection. They were wrong. These individuals are now facing adverse actions. It is too late for those already caught, but hopefully others can learn from The message is their mistake. clear - if you engage in illegal drug use, you will be caught and sanctions shall be imposed.

The Air Guard policy is clear and unequivocal that any Air Guardsman found to have illegally used drugs shall be involuntarily separated. Regulations and the ational Guard Bureau provide guidance that those so separated should be given "Under Other Than Honorable Conditions" characterzations for their service. only does this prevent any future military service, but such a negative discharge can prove a hinderance to future civilian employment. In addition to military programs to identify and eliminate abusers, the trend among government and civilian employers is to also weed out drug abusers. For those already employed in government jobs or in certain civilian companies, a discharge for

drug abuse could also mean a loss of their civilian job.

In addition to involuntary separation or discharge, the drug abuser faces possible criminal prosecution. The urinalysis inpsection program is just that—an inspection. If contraband is letected in an inspection, prosecution under the Hawaii Code of Military Justice is a possible option for command. Illegal or improper drug use which is detected through a urinalysis inspection can be prosecuted and proved with test results.

Some may think that such results are subject to challenge or defense, but will find the contrary. Monitoring, labelling and laboratory safequards eliminate any doubt that the sample has been tampered with, switched, or confused with another. The tests are calibrated to eliminate any possibility that a positive finding could result from passive inhalation of marijuana smoked by others, or use several months or years before the urine sample is taken. Those who think that urinalysis test results which are positive for drugs can be explained away by herbal teas, common medications, laced brownies, or other such stories, will find that such trite excuses will rank with "the check is in the mail."

In short, those in the Air Guard who use drugs illegally or improperly face detection and adverse action, which could hurt even their civilian careers. It is essential that Air Guardsmen stay away from illegal drugs and those who use them. Even legal prescription drugs should only be taken with a eurrent prescription. Drug abuse can and will be eliminated in the Air Guard, with the help of most Guardsmen, and at the expense of any who refuse to learn any other way.
