DRILL AND CEREMONIES

Air Force Manual 50-14, "Drill and Ceremonies," has been revised and is available through publications distribution channels. (See Publishing Bulletin 21, dated 4 November 1977.) The following highlights some of the numerous changes included in the revised edition of the manual:

- ▶ Changes are made in the procedures for open ranks and other movements used in military troop formations.
- ▶ Distances between units in parades and reviews have been standardized.
- ▶ The term "squad" is no longer applicable to Air Force troop formations. The term "element" has been redefined and will be used in lieu of squad.
- ▶ Enlisted women performing duty as color guards may be armed with rifles or revolvers. Color guards, male and female, will not be issued ammunition in certain ceremonies.
- ▶ New guidance has been added on the prevention of fainting by persons participating in ceremonies. Troop commanders and others responsible for the conduct of military ceremonies, such as Honor Guard functions, parades, and change of command ceremonies, should become familiar with this guidance.
- ▶ During flag ceremonies, the previous guidance supporting an old custom for the senior military person in a military vehicle to dismount and salute the flag when the National Anthem or To The Colors is played, has been discontinued. Now, the same guidance applies to personnel in both military and civilian vehicles: all persons remain in the vehicle seated at attention when the National Anthem or To The Colors is played.
- ▶ New guidance, coordinated with the other Services, has been formulated on the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. The Pledge of Allegiance shall not be recited in military formations and ceremonies. There are specific provisions where the Pledge of Allegiance may or may not be recited at protocol functions, and social and sporting events.

Added emphasis is being placed on customs, courtesies, and traditions of the Service. AFM 50-14 is the primary source for much of the guidance involved, and all concerned should become familiar with the Drill and Ceremonies manual. (Mr Moy, HQ USAF/DPPTB, AUTOVON 22-54987)

HICKAM WINS API TROPHY

The base fuels management office at Hickam AFB, Hawaii, has been selected winner of the American Petroleum Institute (API) trophy for the third year in a row. The API trophy is awarded to the base fuels management office judged most outstanding in the Air Force. The competition is designed to stimulate command interest in petroleum supply and handling operations and to improve servicing and safety procedures. This year's runner-ups were Dover AFB, Del., and Bergstrom AFB, Tex.

SELRIDGE ANG UNIT TO GET F-4C AIRCRAFT

The 191st Fighter Interceptor Group, Selfridge Air National Guard Base, Mich., will convert from the F-106 Delta Dart interceptor to the F-4C Phantom fighter next spring. The conversion will allow the F-106s to be redistributed to other units to increase the overall aerospace defense capability. This will result in a loss of eight military personnel authorizations and 25 full-time Air Reserve technicians. The change is a continuation of the modernization of the Air Reserve Forces announced earlier this year.

SUPPLY DISCIPLINE—AFLC

What is supply discipline? Supply discipline is defined in paragraph 13d of AFR 67-10, "Responsibility for Public Property in Possession of the Air Force." In simple terms it is the personal obligation and responsibility of all of us to care properly for supplies, assure their economical use, protect security and pilferage type items, make proper disposition of excess supplies and equipment, not overbuy or hoard but keep only what we need.

Supply discipline is everybody's job. How can supply discipline be practiced? Order only what you need, use your supplies and materials wisely, do not waste them, protect at all times property which is in your custody, do not ever put Government material to personal use.

Do you practice supply discipline?

Look at your own desk. How many tablets, pencils, pens, etc., do you have stored? The Base Service Store is the place these items are stored to be available for use when someone needs them. People who collect and store items just because they see them available and think they may need them some day are denying their use to someone who may need the item today to do their job.

Practice supply discipline, don't stockpile supplies. Let the Base Service Store hold them for everyone's use. In other words, treat your supplies, materials, vehicles and tools just like you paid for them out of your pocket. After all, these items were bought out of your tax payer dollars. 

It doesn't just pay to belong . . . It pays very well.


