A Holiday Message to All Members of the State Department of Defense

Maj. Gen. Edward V Richardson, Adjutant General, HIANG

As another exciting and productive year comes to a close, I would like to take a moment to reflect on the tremendous involvement and contributions accomplished by our State Department of Defense. Our team went beyond the call despite the difficult fiscal conditions that faced us in both the State and Federal agencies.

We managed to maintain an even balance in the Hawaii National Guard (HING) and continued to improve our readiness as we took on new missions and challenges. The HING also did an outstanding job in orchestrating the Mission Aloha drive to assist the people in Kobe, Japan, as well as collecting relief supplies for Mission Aloha II for victims in the Philippines. Our Hawaii Air National Guard (HIANG) deployed in support of real world" contingency operations in Panama, Turkey, Wake

Island and Italy, and performed in a highly professional manner. The Hawaii Army National Guard (HIARNG) continued its training as one of the nation's elite National Guard organizations. As one of only 15 enhanced readiness brigades in the nation, the 29th will be fully staffed, equipped and trained to be deployable in a responsive manner. The HIARNG's AVIM unit began providing aviation maintenance and repair to the US Army Pacific, and our CH-47s were added to the inventory during the past year. The HING's Youth Challenge Program graduated 98 corpsmembers from two separate classes and will graduate another 85 in February 1996. Personnel from the HING participated in a number of Counterdrug and Drug Demand Reduction Programs.

In the area of Civil Defense, our State Civil Defense (SCD) personnel worked hard to develop the Pacific Disaster Center (PDC) on Maui, and we participated in several disaster response exercises. The PDC will use the world's most advanced remote sensing and computing assets to bring new information products to emergency managers in the Pacific and will serve as a prototype for a network of national disas-

ter centers. Further, the HING and SCD planned, conducted and helped evaluate two large-scale exercises with over 100 Federal, State, county and private organizations. This effort will prove beneficial should another natural disaster or State emergency strike the islands.

The Office of Veterans Services (OVS) worked very closely with the HING, SCD and departmental staff to execute a very successful World War II 50th Anniversary Commemoration that was televised to all parts of the globe. We were the principal organizer of Hawaii Remembers" at the Waikiki Shell. This entertainment was a patriotic extravaganza that featured our 111th Army Band, the legendary Bob Hope and other local talents. The OVS, working in concert with the HING, participated in the memorial service at the National Cemetery of the Pacific, the Veterans Parade and the aerial salute through Waikiki, the Joint Services Review and aerial flyby at Wheeler, the aerial flyby during the Parade of Ships and the National Guard Plague Dedication at Punchbowl.

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You can readily see that we set the pace in a number of important historical events and key initiatives. It was the joint effort by our entire team that made things happen" with positive results. Please thank your personnel for their exceptional support throughout the year. We could not have done so much without their leadership, dedication and continued quest for excellence. I want to also recognize all the family members and friends who made many sacrifices so that their loved ones could serve our great country and the State of Hawaii. Each of our officers, soldiers, airmen and civilian employees can be very proud of their visible achievements in helping make 1995 a very productive and memorable one. I am very grateful and honored to be a member of the Hawaii State Department of Defense! Let's now take some time to spend with our families during the forthcoming holidays.

In closing, Celia joins me in wishing you a Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year.

Submitting your article(s) this way makes it easy to identify and it will also protect your documents and ensure their return. When we've finished with it, we'll return it to you for next time.

Harassment

This month's Social
Actions theme focuses on the issue of harassment. The most commonly known form of harassment is Sexual Harassment - a form of sex discrimination that involves unwelcomed sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when:

- Submission to or rejection of such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of a person's job, pay or career.
- Submission to or rejection of such conduct by a person is used as a basis for

career or employment decisions affecting that person.

 Such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's work performance or creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive work environment.

We don't often hear of the first two conditions. They are of an overt nature. The third condition may or may not be overt and more than likely, it won't be, but it's the one that we hear about and gets most people in trouble.

Be aware that actions can be **perceived** as sexual in nature (looking, speaking, gesturing, touching, or even how close one is standing). If these actions create an uncomfortable, intimidating, hostile or offensive work environment, affected individuals need to make it clear that such behavior is offensive and unwelcome. Individuals who are further subjected to such behavior should report it to the appropriate supervisor or commander.

Remember that we all have a right to an environment free from discrimination and harassment according to the 1965 Civil Rights Act. Harassment in the workplace is contrary to the standards of professionalism and counterproductive to our mission.

Note: "Workplace" is an expansive term for military members and may include conduct on or off duty, 24 hours a day.

New Spill Response Procedures at Hickam AFB

15 ABW recently instituted some changes to their hazardous materials spill response procedures that shift more responsibilities to the 154 Wing and other users on base. Although these changes are not significant, all 154 Wing personnel operating with or around hazardous materials should be aware of them. Here is a quick summary of the procedures to be followed:

- All spills are still RE-PORTED to the fire department 449-7117.
- If it is an emergency, the new fire department HAZMAT team will respond. (Large spills are emergencies).
- 3. After the emergency is over (or if it was not an emergency), the unit will CLEAN UP the spill. The unit will also pack, mark and move the WASTE to the 90 day accumulation site. You can count on support from the 154 Wing Environmental Office to accomplish this.
- 4. This means the unit will have to have an in-house capability to handle your typical spill. Also you should have some spill training.
- 5. The base will offer 4 hour spill training in January. This is not the 1 week course in moon suits, but rather a more practical, shorter course for

"post-response" clean-up. Call 449-8998 to schedule.

 Units should continue to use O&M funds to purchase and maintain small spill cleanup supplies and they should still leave emergency spills to the HAZMAT team.

Space "A" Register Time Extended

Registrants for space available travel can now keep their names on the Space "A" registry for up to 60 days, thanks to a suggestion by a military traveler. Officials in the Air Mobility Command Operations Directorate say that the new time limit is effective immediately and replaces the 45-day limit set early last year.

Reserve component personnel are restricted to Space-A travel within the 50 states and four US territories, American Samoa, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

The military uniform is no longer required, but appropriate civilian attire must be worn on all AMC flights. Also, the \$10 administrative fee has been discontinued. However, reservists must present a completed Form 1853 along with their ID card when ready to fly.


All 1st Sergeants, E-7, E-8 and E-9, are encouraged to attend. Please coordinate with your supervisor and/or unit commander for approval to attend
