COPE CANINE UNLEASHED

Out in the non-military world the term "Cope Canine" would probably have to do with a jogger's nightly ordeal with neighborhood dogs. However, here at the 154th "Cope Canine" stands for a high-powered exercise that evaluates the Hawaiian Air Defense System (HADS). Yesterday was Cope Canine day.

This exercise is held twice each year and involves Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine equipment and personnel along with the Hawaii Air National Guard.

The 154th along with the 169th and the 150th ACW squadrons are charged with the primary responsibility for the air



defense for the Hawaiian area.

The 326th Air Division runs the exercise in order to measure the abilities of all the varied forces. This exercise also involves an Air Force E-3A AWACS aircraft with its distinctive six-foot thick, 30 foot diameter radar dome. Yesterday's Cope Canine operated, for the most part from the Battery Selfridge command post.

We cannot afford this form of inflation because it ultimately causes us to have to do more with even less. Accidents greatly reduce our already limited resources whether they simply make us repeat the work or result in destroyed property, major injuries, and lost time. Consequently, the objective for Safety Day is to review procedures, programs, and potential problem areas to eliminate mishap potential and improve safety awareness within our group.

For example, we've had two minor fires recently within the group. One in a maintenance shop was due to improper wiring of an air-conditioner that was done by a contractor in 1975!. Because of this fire we almost lost the shop. Always look at things with a critical eye. The second was a short circuit in a water heater in the main hanger. Due to a smart NCO on duty after-hours, this fire did not destroy the hanger. It could have as just a few hours before, the fire department came by and shut-off the alarm system because it had a short! As a wise man once said...If we don't learn from history we're bound to repeat it over and over again.

The Diving Locker

Coast Guard officials report that there are about 3,000 boat owners statewide with a "CF" designation in their registration number. If you're one of them, you should be aware of a Coast Guard safety regulation that's been in effect since July. It requires those boat owners to install retro-reflective material on lifesaving equipment or on personal floatation devices (PFD's).

According to a Coast Guard spokesperson from the Boating Safety Office, the rule will mainly affect weekend or part-time commercial fishermen.

LIMU FOR FUN AND PROFIT...

If you've ever used one of those toothpastes with a gel in it, you've brushed your teeth with seaweed. Well...at least a seaweed product. You'll also find it in your beer, ice cream, salad dressing, pharmaceuticals and paint.

There are many common uses of the seaweed--especially for eating. Limu is also valuable to industry because of chemical byproducts called phycocolloids. Aside from their part in gel toothpastes and the like, colloids are useful in cosmetic production and a necessary ingredient of canned evaporated milk and chocolate milk. Colloids act as the stabilizing agent that makes the milk uniformly smooth and creamy.

There are money-making possibilities for enterprising seaweed farmers. Besides selling to industry, there is another market to consider. A farmer can sell fresh seaweed at a local farmer's market and get \$2.95 per pound--wet weight. In Japan some kinds of dried nori sell for \$35 per pound.

The wise farmer must be selective about where to raise his crop. If they will grow in Kaneohe Bay, it doesn't necessarily mean they will grow in Waikiki; it doesn't mean

they'll grow in Pearl Harbor, etc.

It's best to find a place where the limu will grow well if unattended.

If your back is strong, you can harvest relatively cheaply, what is thought to be a luxury crop because it brings in quite a bit of money. Give it a try.

NOT SO CURRENT CURRENCY TRIVIA

Did you know the words "In God We Trust" have been on the penny since 1909, on the dime since 1916, and on the nickel since 1938? It was not until 1955 that Congress instructed Treasury to put those words on all currency of the U.S.

The \$1 bill, the one Servicemembers see the most of, has the Great Seal of the United States on its reverse, along with three Latin inscriptions: "E Pluribus Unum (Out of Many, One), Annuit Coeptis (He Has Favored Our Undertakings), and Novus Ordo Seclorum (A New Order of the Ages).

Larger bills have various scenes on the back. If you ever see a \$20 bill, you'll have a brief glimpse of the White House before the bill disappears for gas or food.

Finally, ten percent of all the Nation's currency are coins.

But that's another story.

CWD

Usually disaster preparedness information is prepared in a special bulletin, but this month the topic will be covered with a different slant. Chemical Warfare Defense (CWD) will be covered in the context of the Air Force effort.

The CWD program became a high priority issue beginning with the 1975 budget year. Since that time the Air Force has spend about \$93 million, and estimates that over \$300 million will be needed to provide equipment, training and manpower in support of CWD by 1985.

Most of the money was allotted to forces in Europe and Korea that are committed to NATO. For the next two fiscal years, the Guard is programmed to receive \$5 million each year or 25% of the total Air Force CWD budget.

This allotted money will provide the Guard with the necessary training, supplies and equipment needed for support.

We have just gotten started with the CWD program in the Hawaii Air National Guard and look forward to being fully prepared for mobility tasks and demonstrating our capabilities during future ORI's.

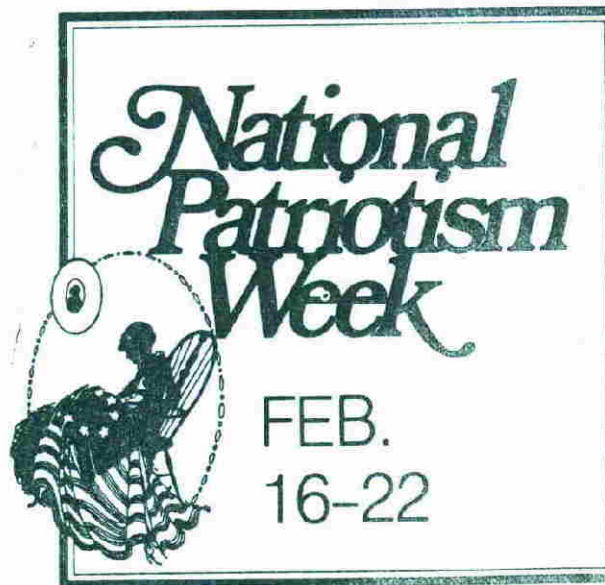

Any tie breakers that have to be played will be held on March 16th.

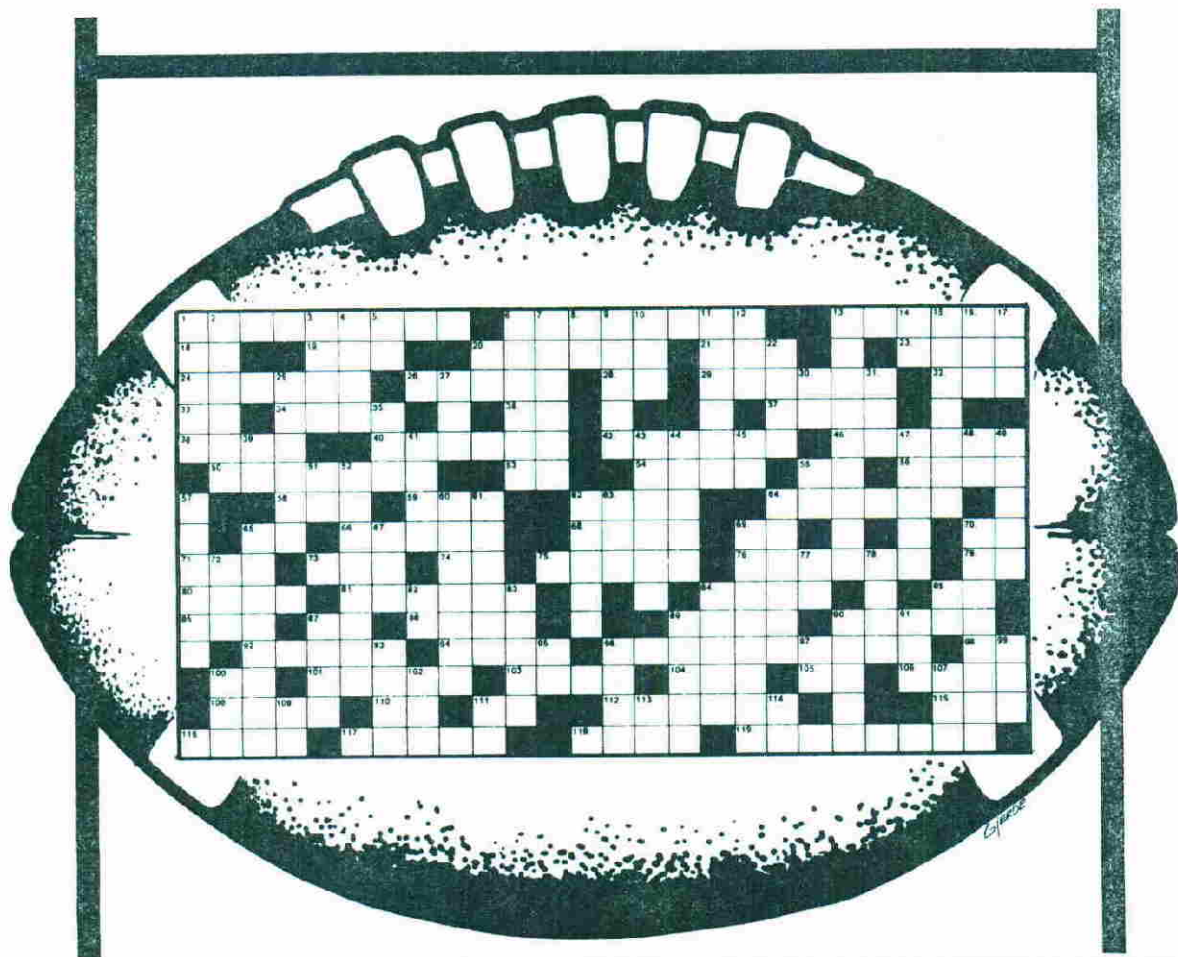
HANG OHANA CANOE CLUB...

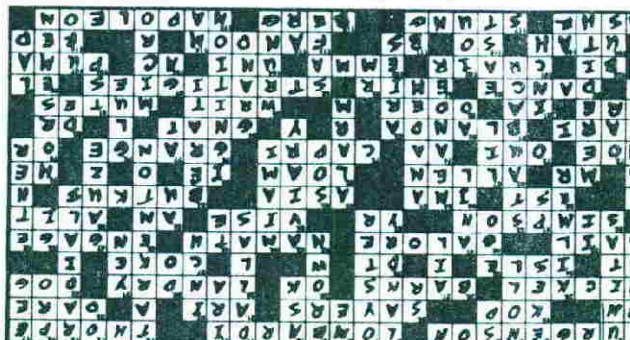

To "Coin" a Phrase

Where Did "Dollar" Come From?

You handle money almost every day of your adult life. That is, you do if the paycheck lasts until the end of the month.

But how much do you know about the paper currency of the U.S.?

For instance, do you know that every piece of paper currency measures 6.14 x 2.61 inches, with each bill about .0043 inches thick and weighing .03 Troy ounces?

You didn't?

Do you know the word "dollar" comes from the name of a large silver coin once minted in Bohemia, the "Joachimsthaler?" "Thalers," as they were called, rapidly gained favor throughout Europe. The name was modified according to language of the various countries, becoming "daalder" in Holland, "daler" in Scandinavia, and "dollar" in England. When it came to setting up the money structure for the newly free United States of America,

Congress stated that "the money of account in the United States shall be expressed in dollars" instead of the English pounds and shillings.

Some other money trivia: A three-cent demand note of 1864 was the smallest paper currency issued in the U.S., the \$100 bill is the largest in circulation today, and at one time there were \$100,000 bills, but they were used for bank business only.

Guard News

Important Reminder

Mandatory wear date of the subdued utility uniform for all Air Guardsmen is Apr. 1, 1981. This wear date was established to provide sufficient time for procurement and distribution of subdued items.

Tuition Waiver

Members of the Hawaiian Air National Guard on UH campuses who are recipients of benefits under the GI bill or Social Security Assistance program are eligible for the UH tuition waiver.

If you meet the University's eligibility requirements your Guard commander will issue you a certificate of good standing. This certificate must be brought with you when registering at the campus. University personnel will verify your degree program and residency status.

Cashiers will then accept your certification in lieu of payment. The waiver covers only tuition however, be prepared to pay the various fees that are also charged at the time of registration.
