F-15 TO REPLACE F-4



On February 5, 1986, the Air Force announced proposed changes in the tactical force structure of the Air Force Re- ' serve and Air National Guard. The Hawaii Air National Guard's 24 F-4C (Phantom) fighter aircraft will be replaced by 24 F-15 (Eagle) aircraft in the summer of 1987, which will greatly enhance Hawaii's air defense system for the people of Hawaii. The F-15 is recognized as one of the finest fighter aircraft in the world today. Its superior acceleration, range, Weapons and avionics will enable the Hawaii Air National Guard to intercept. identify and destroy, if necessary, potential hostile aircraft at a greater distance from our shores.

According to Major General Alexis T. Lum, State Adjutant General, "The aircraft represents a monumental leap for Hawaii's air defense and will provide a greater level of protection for the State of Hawaii. Hawaii has a definite need for this expanded capability and the waii Air National Guard has demonstrated its ability to put the F-15 to the best possible use for our State and Nation."

The Hawaii Air National Guard becomes the third Guard unit in the nation to be programmed for the F-15s, following the 159th Tactical Fighter Group,


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COPE CANINE - Hickam

A joint military air defense exercise is being conducted in and around Hawaii this weekend. People and equipment from the U.S. Air Force, Navy, Marines, and Hawaii Air National Guard will participate in the excercise. COPE CANINE, a USCINCPAC-sponsored exercise is planned and coordinated by the 326th Air Division and will test the capabilities and readiness of the 326th AD., the Hawaii Air National Guard and other military units to respond to simulated air attacks. The 326th Air Division, headquartered at Wheeler Air Force Base is responsible for directing and evaluating air defense activities during COPE CANINE. The Pearl Harbor-based guided missile destroyers. USS Goldsborough and USS Benjamin Stoddert will provide sea-based anti-air missile support during the exercise. Exercise activities will be held in designated training areas.

Participants in this exercise include the 154th Composite Group, 169th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron and 150th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron, 199th Tactical Fighter Squadron, 15th Air Base Wing, 9th Airborne Command and Control Squadron, 6594th Test Group, 15th Air Force, March Air Force Base, California, and 961st Airborne Warning and Control Squadron, Kadena Air Base, Japan. Other units include Patrol Wing-2 and Fleet Composite Squadron-1 from Naval Air Station Barbers Point, and units of Marine Air Group-24 stationed at Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station. Our F-4C's provide the Air Force with response capability for the Air Defense of Hawaii. Additionally, the HANG operates two radar sites aroundthe-clock at Mf. Kaala Air Force Station on Oahu and Kokee Air Force Station on

Kauai.



Perhaps you've read about the Gramm Rudman-Hollings Act and how it's affecting our nation, national defense and the Well it has finally world economy. reached the Hawaii Air National Guard with considerable impact. In plain language, we will cut our budget beginning in April and for a total of six months by about \$1,000,000. In our operations and maintenance allocation, significant reductions were projected in the following areas:

- Civilian pay will be reduced by \$110,530 by freezing seven full time positions: 169 ACWS Air Traffic Controller, HQ 154 Management Assistant, Logistics Management Specialist, Aircraft Mechanic Foreman, CAMRON Production Controller, Health Technician, Military Personnel Clerk and the 201st Electronic

Mechanic positions.

- Reduction in our F-4 flying will result in some savings. These savings will result in reduced training for our aircrews and if you look at why we are all here, you can now understand how biga "cut" we will be experiencing.


- Supply reductions of \$618,592 shop we have. will affect every "penny pinching" Conservation and measures have already been instructed to live on our austere budget.

- Other appropriation areas which will be reduced include our overhead living costs, travel, communication,

equipment and medical funding.

What does this mean for you and me? It means that we must seriously look at what we are doing and how we are doing it with a deliberate assessment of making every training minute count. It means that several support areas will have to compensate for their projected manpower freeze through reorganized team effort; that supply accounts will require close control and spartan management and finally, the bottom line requires that

our flying sorties be optimised to meet our tactical training needs without compromising our demand for quality training and maintenance of our safety standards.

This is why you may have headaches, upset stomachs, fatigue or other undesirable symptoms. Excercise channels this energy. A good way to channel this energy is to train several times a week for the 3 mile walk or 1 1/2 mile run that we are required to do.

The level of stress we are under determines the quality of life we have. Since we all want to enjoy our lives, let us wisely manage the stress we have. Ultimately, let us remember to bring all of our concerns and anxieties before God and lay them at His feet. Prayer helps. God will help. What more can I stress?!

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PAY NOTES \$\$

SURE PAY

The Air National Guard has continued to encourage your participation in the SUREPAY program because: (1) the problem involved in obtaining a replacement check (approximately 1000 checks are stolen or lost each year. Replacing a check usually takes 6 weeks or longer after the member has issued a stop payment).

(2) funds directly deposited into your account at your designated financial institution regardless whether your earning statement is delayed in the mail and (3) a continued service of funds for you and your dependants in the event of long active duty terms or mobilization.

With the HANG's current participation rate at 40%, the ultimate goal of the ANG is 100%. In December of last year, the Air Force converted to paper checks. One of the reasons was the high cost of using cards. Your participation in SUREPAY will further save the AF money and offer you the convenience of not making that extra trip to the bank.

Just fill the required information on the SF1199A and we'll get you started. If any assistance is needed Military Pay personnel will be glad to help you.

HOUSING ALLOWANCE TERMINATED

With the signing into law of the FY 86 DOD Authorization Act on November 8, 1985, station and rent plus housing allowance terminated upon the completion of any tour of duty that included November 8, 1985. Thereafter reserve members were converted to the Variable Housing Allowance (VHA). Since VHA is only authorized for tours of 20 weeks or longer, it effectively has eliminated a housing allowance entitlement for our reserve members. NOTE: Not applicable to full-time AGR members since they are on a long-tour.

New Orleans, Louisiana, and the 116th Tactical Fighter Wing, Dobbins AFB, Georgia. Hawaii's early selection for force modernization can be attributed to the very strong support received from Pacific Air Forces and the National Guard Bureau and our Hawaii Air National Guard's unique air defense mission and its outstanding accomplishments. Over the next decade, several other Air National Guard units will be programmed for the F-15 aircraft as part of the modernization of the reserve forces.

As part of the conversion from the F-4C to F-15 aircraft, the Hawaii Air National Guard will be upgrading and expanding its facilities at Hickam AFB to accommodate the new aircraft at an estimated cost of \$8.2 million. An additional \$15.2 million of improvements, unrelated to the conversion, will be made to accommodate other facility needs of

the Hawaii Air Nationla Guard at Hickam AFB.

The conversion of the F-4C to F-15 aircraft will result in a slight increase in full-time and military manning for the 154th Composite Group, Hickam AFB, Hawaii. Some on-board personnel will be affected by the conversion. They will be reassigned and trained for new duties since the F-15 is less labor intensive to maintain than the F-4C because of improved technology and requires only one pilot to perform its mission. The F-4C currently requires both a pilot and a weapons system officer to perform its mission. However, no existing personnel will be laid off since the overall manpower authorization will be slightly increased, as previously mentioned.

This conversion from the F-4C to the F-15 will be the fifth aircraft conversion for the Hawaii Air National Guard over the past four decades. Brigadier General Edward V. Richardson, Hawaii Air National Guard Commander, stated, "Since 1956, we have provided 24-hour air defense for the State of Hawaii and our people. With strong support from the Pacific Air Forces, we have worked hard to continually upgrade our people's training, our tactics and our equipment to deny any potential adversary an undue advantage. General Robert W. Bazley, Commander in Chief, Pacific Air Forces, and the late General Jerome F. O'Malley deserve much of the credit for modernization of Hawaii's

air defense system. Their support and recognition of the Hawaii Air National Guard's accomplishments contributed directly to our early conversion to the F-15. The F-15 is the world's premier fighter aircraft and, combined with our outstanding aircrews and support personnel, I feel that the Hawaii Air National Guard will have the best air defense force for years to come. This conversion has added significance to all the men and women in the Hawaii Air National guard as we celebrate our 40th anniversary in serving Hawaii's people and our Nation."

THE HANG GOES TO EUROPE

Last month Major Ace Ellinwood and Captain Chuck Manley, left Hawaii headed for Ramstein AB, Germany. They are the first of six aircrews from Hawaii to participate in Creek Klaxon, the name of the mission given to the Air National Guard by USAFE Headquarters located at Ramstein.

The mission which will last up to 12 months requires the ANG F-4 Air Defense units to provide aircraft, maintenence crews and aircrews in order to perform the alert mission at Ramstein. This mission which is usually the responsibility of the AF's 86TFW located at Ramstein are transitioning from F-4Es to F-16s and it is during this period starting April 1, 86, that they requested for ANG support.

The mission will mark the first time there has been an all-ANG air defense detachment in Europe. Eight F4D aircraft will be provided by the 148FIG at Duluth, Minn., the 119FIG at Fargo, N.D., and the 144FIW at Fresno, Calif. The aircraft wil: rotate every 6 months while aircrews rotate every 90 days. The support people will serve for periods ranging from 30 to 139 days.

Creek Klaxon provides the HANG a unique opportunity to train in the European Theatre. Scrambles on Russian aircraft near the German borders may be a common occurance, but for the crews each one is an exciting and tense experience. This kind of experience and the opportunity to travel around Europe made the selection for the 12 HANG aircrew slots a grueling task, especially when 99% of the aircrews wanted to go. But, by last December the selection was announced with Ellingwood and Manley leaving first, then followed in 90 day intervals by Daye Talbert and Stan CREEK Continued

Osserman, Hal Schatz and Mike Dudley, Kimo Kelly and Clyde Torigoe, Ken Sussel and Scott Hoadley, and finally bringing up the rear, Mick Melich and Lordy Dowson. To these lucky aircrews and the whole gang of maintanence crews that were selected, we bid you all, Aloha and many happy knockwursts.

GUAM DEPLOYMENT

The 154th Composite Group deployed ten F-4C aircraft to Andersen AFB, Guam, from January 28 to February 7, 1986, to participate in the Guam Air Defense Exercise. In addition, PACAF IG tasked the HANG to provide adversary aircraft in support of a joint PACAF/SAC ORI for the 18 TFW F-15s from Kadena and the 43SW B-52s from Andersen. This allowed our aircrews to practice as a deployed air defense unit against electronic-warfare equipped B-52s and advanced air-to-air F-15 aircraft which are rarely available in our local training area.

After returning home the aircrews had positive reactions towards the deplyment. Some of their comments were, "CBPO's outprocessing was outstanding, especially in providing advanced per diem way ahead of time." "It was nice to finally have airline seats for everyone on the tankers." "The duty days may have been long (16 hours), but were made up for by the excellent flying missions against the Eagles." And finally, "The GCI (150th ACW) was outstanding. The face-to-face briefings with the controllers provided the opportunity to ensure total understanding of mission requirements and resulted in better situational awareness and better control from them.'

Overall, the Guam deployment proved to be a challenging and rewarding experience for all. As Major Mick Melich of the 199TFS Weapons and Tactics Office states, "The HANG was tasked to the maximum and met this challenge head-on with hard work, teamwork and professionalism. The quality of sorties, the demands of composite forces training, and the intensive tasking provided the HANG with a true test of its mission capability. The lessons learned provided us with the knowledge, experience, and desire to excel both as individuals and team members alike."

NEW ALERT FACILITY

The dedication of the newly renovated Alert Pad was held on February 21. At the ceremonies were VIPs from PACAF, 15ABW, HANG HQ, and the 154 COMPG. Colonel B.V.
